Last month we heard that along with our partner social enterprise, Insider Access, 2makeit had been taken forward into the public voting round for a grant from the Nat West Skills and Opportunities Fund to support a community rehabilitation project for ex-offenders.

GREAT NEWS! We have been awarded funding for the project! This is a great breakthrough for two small organisations working in an area that is not usually the most popular of causes. Also thank you to everyone who voted for us and who encouraged friends and colleagues to support us. In addition to the actual grant it will be a very good opportunity to raise our profile in a very positive way and increase our chances of further pro bono corporate support and interest.

A few questions and answers about Traidcraft

Is Traidcraft still relevant now with fair trade goods in the shops?

This is just one of the many questions that was raised when Traidcraft announced in November that it may have to close if a new way of trading was not found, after one of the largest losses in its history. Since then it has been looking for a new trading model and it announced in early December that a viable one has been found. This will mean a large reduction of the craft on sale in the catalogues, a large number of staff at the head office being made redundant, and contracting out of most of the services including the warehouse and distribution side.



The new catalogue will not be available until March. It will have mainly food with only a few craft items, if any, and fewer cards, as they drop from about 2,000 items to about 200. This has affected the producers greatly and the charitable trust, a separate body, is helping them to find new markets.

Why was it considered essential for Traidcraft to try and continue?

Traidcraft's role is still crucial (40 years this year). As an organisation dedicated to fighting poverty through trade, the money earned by Traidcraft is invested in existing fair trade producers and in developing new ones. It gives hope to the three billion people living on under \$2 a day, as it works to bring the benefits of trade to those who need it most.

Why can I buy fair trade products cheaper in supermarkets?

Supermarkets sell high volumes so they can afford to make very little profit on each item. In fact, supermarkets and other food producers would not have access to fair trade products if organisations like Traidcraft did not exist.

Traidcraft stalls are the backbone of everything the trading arm does, so please continue to support ours.



Santorini

Editor's note. We are including this article in February to brighten up a winter's day. Enjoy!

Tom and I recently visited the beautiful, tiny Greek Island of Santorini, renowned for its spectacular sunsets. It has a population of approx. 10,500 and approx. 250 churches, mostly painted white with a bright blue domed roof.

We visited the capital city Fira with its narrow, cobbled streets and hundreds of little shops and restaurants perched high on the edge of the mountain. The Catholic Cathedral (not as big as St. Augustine's church) with the Bishop's house next door are there at the top with glorious views across the sea to the volcano and other smaller islands. This breath-taking view, God's beautiful creation, must surely make Islanders and visitors alike realise just how volatile life is.



Hundreds of visitors call in to the Cathedral every day – there is such a warm welcome for everyone. There are handouts for all in a dozen different languages with the words of St. Francis “Make me an instrument of your peace, where there is hatred – let me sow Love” and the bible reading encouraging Love in Action from Romans chapter 12 verses 9-21 ‘Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good’.

In the silence guests are encouraged with these words to light a candle:

‘I may not know how to pray...
 I may not know what to say...
 Maybe I do not have the time now to be here in this place...
 The light of this candle represents everything I am thanking You for
 And everything I am asking You for ...
 It represents my time...
 It represents a part of myself that I leave before You Lord
 The light that shines is the symbol of my prayer
 My unbroken union with you God of Love, Joyful and Merciful Father...
 A union that will be with me forever’.

It may be that you have never prayed before, do not know where or how to start to pray, or it may be that you just don't have the words right now – you don't need a cathedral – find a quiet place in your home, light a candle to represent Jesus the light of the world, still your mind and leave the rest to the Lord.



The Unshakable Truth by J & S McDowell

A mature Christian observed a little while ago that the antidote to doubt is faith. She possibly meant that in following her faith in Jesus Christ as her Lord and Saviour, such doubts dissipate.

But what about those who have never had faith, those from a different faith background, those who have been convinced by humanism, or those who just see the apparently archaic structures of the organised church and decide they want none of it? Or those of us who want to understand our faith in the light of the startling scientific discoveries, including in cosmological and particle physics and in genetics in today's world? In this time of great changes in communication and social media, of fake news and attempted subversion of democracy, never has it been more important for the message and truth of Jesus to be relevant to the next generation.



If you are looking for something that places the fundamental truths of Christianity on a logical evidential basis in a readable way, with illustrations and nuggets of both knowledge and humour, then the book *'The Unshakable Truth'* by Josh and Sean McDowell might be worth considering. It also comes in the form of a study guide for individual or group study.

The book seeks to help develop the reader's faith by focussing on the principles of the Nicene Creed, agreed in 325 AD and adopted by the entire Christian world. Included is looking at the evidence for God's existence, evidence that the Bible is accurate and reliable, evidence for Jesus, that he became human, that he was God's perfect sacrifice and that he rose again. The meaning of the Trinity and the evidence for and purpose of the Holy Spirit are examined.

The book also includes evidence for life after death, where the authors show how recent scientific knowledge, far from disproving such notions, actually makes them plausible. We now know that the matter and energy in our known universe is only a small fraction of that which exists, the rest being called 'dark matter and dark energy'. Most of what exists, in a world created by a God who is outside space and time, is hidden from us!

You may be excited or repelled by such musings 'beyond our ken' so be assured that much of this book is aimed at helping the reader to develop a faith as a personal relationship with God: '... we pray that you will come to know God more deeply, understand your place within him and the world more clearly. And above all, we pray that God will empower you more fully to live out your biblical worldview so that you can more effectively impart the living truth of Jesus Christ to your family and those around you.'


