The curve is ready for bending

It's nearly eighteen months since Helen and I had the honour of speaking to the community in Hempnall about our climate challenge. How the world has changed since! Little did we know how all our lives would be upended over the ensuing months. And for Helen and I, the arrival of baby Orla a few weeks later changed things even more. Having a new baby amid a national lockdown was a strange and sometimes trying experience. But Orla also gave us a focus for our energy, attention and love, when so much outside our walls was so troubling.

Climate change always loomed large over our thinking about having children, and it has loomed over our relationship with Orla too. Despite a small dip during the initial lockdowns, greenhouse gas emissions have continued to rise. The recent report of the UN IPCC made for some sobering reading. The message is clearer than ever – it's happening, it's us, effects are everywhere, and it looks pretty bad. The report reduced the uncertainties about when certain temperature thresholds will be passed. We might pass 1.5°C, the 'aspiration' of the Paris Agreement, before Orla is in high school. And supercomputers can tell us with increasing confidence just how much of the weird weather we've been seeing worldwide is due to our emissions (answer: a lot).

But the report also clarified something important. If emissions were to stop (or reach 'net zero') globally, temperatures would stop rising. They could even start to fall. It sounds like a simple relationship, but the science underneath is devilishly complicated. But that simple finding offers hope, and it empowers. We can, as a global society, choose our climatic future, and we can start doing so now, this year. Perhaps by the time Orla is entering her 30s she'll be watching that temperature curve start to bend downwards. Who knows, maybe she'll even be helping to bend it herself.

A lot of people who worry about having children at the moment are concerned, understandably, either that the world will just be too awful in the future, or that their children, through their existence in a high-carbon economy, will just exacerbate the problem. But I refuse to see Orla as just a few tonnes of CO₂ emissions, nor as a passive victim of the world she's been thrust into. Instead, all our children are world-changers; people who, in the future, will remake the world in their own image, not in ours. All we can do is give them the best tools, and the best materials. So let's start bending those curves downwards now, so that Orla and co. can finish the job.

My family and I do lots of things to help with climate change. We have solar panels on our roof which generate electricity from the sun. We have air source heating which means that our heating and hot water is not powered by fossil fuels. We try to keep the heating in the home warm, but not too hot, so that we don't waste energy. We always put full loads of washing on and use eco mode on the washing machine. We turn lights off when we leave a room.

We use re-usable water bottles and we try to reduce our use of plastic by buying bars of shampoo, conditioner and soap and we also now use the eco egg laundry egg so that we no longer have to use washing capsules. We also recycle as much as possible.

News from Woodton Primary School

Focus on climate change

The topic of climate change is an important one for our children at Woodton Primary as they will be most affected by any changes that are or are not made now. The children have inherited the actions of their predecessors on the earth and are the ones that will be able to make positive changes to ensure that planet earth is here for many years to come.



As the future of the planet is uncertain, we feel that it is important for our children to learn how to protect our earth in their every day lives.

We teach the children to respect the earth. One way in which we do this is through the Forest School sessions. The children gain a knowledge and understanding of the natural world and their local environment.

In addition to forest schools, we also run a weekly gardening club, so that the children understand where their food comes from and learn about the importance of reducing the number of miles that their food travels, so that it has the least impact on the planet. In past years they have even produced enough fruit and vegetables to sell to parents and the local community.

We also have an annual 'Eco Day' to help the children learn about current world issues. Our latest day focused on the use of plastic and the affect that it has on ocean life.

During our collective worship (assemblies), we have a Big Question once a week which often links to the challenges of climate change and encourages the children to think about simple changes that they can make in their lives, like recycling, reusing and reducing the waste we produce. Our latest Big Question was "How can we help to slow down climate change?"



We also teach the children the importance of working together to overcome challenges and to celebrate everyone's differences in an ever changing and diverse world. We have started the process of becoming a 'School of Sanctuary'. We will join other schools across Norfolk to welcome all pupils, including those who have had to flee their own country as a refugee.

The children are encouraged to walk to school and we open the gates so that it is safe for them to walk directly from the village.

We also teach the children how to cycle and be safe on the roads - all small steps to supporting climate change and understanding the impact that cars and the use of precious fossil fuels has on our planet.

We are always keen to work with our local and wider communities to combat climate change and we will be supporting the COP26 in November to support an increase in action, to build a brighter future for our children and future generations.

Will Sargent, farmer in Morningthorpe

Climate change used to be something discussed only by scientists, but now almost everyone has an opinion on it. Every day at least one news story has a climate connection. Whether it's forest fires in California or flooding in Germany, man's impact on the environment is usually to blame. Back home in the UK, it's easy to switch off from extreme events happening elsewhere, but unfortunately we're now beginning to feel the effects of changing weather patterns.

As a farmer, my business is heavily dependent on the weather. If we don't get the right mix of sunshine and rain, it can have a devastating impact. The last two years have been difficult. Very wet autumns followed by dry springs have meant less grain in the barn and that has a big impact on the bottom line. Of course, there are things we can do to adapt. We've started to grow more crops in the spring and others that are more tolerant to drought. We're also cutting down on air pollution. Our newest tractors produce lower emissions than their predecessors and also burn less fuel.

Recently, farmers have faced criticism for the impact they have on the environment, but I feel much of this is based on misinformation and a lack of understanding. The beef industry is often portrayed as a mass polluter, but how many people think about the carbon that's locked up in permanent pasture? If we decided to plough up this grass and plant vegetables in its place, thousands of tonnes of carbon would be released into the atmosphere every year.

Climate change is here to stay and we must all work together to adapt. In my experience, farmers are at the forefront of positive change in helping to care for our environment and must be supported.

Greening the Group Office

Here in the Group Office we try to be as eco conscious as possible. We use recycled toners in our printer, print on both sides of the paper when we can and try to send as little as possible to landfill. We also make sure all our office appliances are switched off at the end of the day (*did you know leaving your PC monitor on overnight can waste enough electricity to laser print 500 pages and leaving your printer on standby overnight wastes enough energy to make 30 cups of tea*).



There is always room for improvement and one very simple step we have made is to change our search engine for the internet. We now use 'Ecosia' (<https://www.ecosia.org/>) instead of Google. Using 'Ecosia' is just as easy as using Google. Every time you search for anything on the web search ads create income for 'Ecosia' and they then use this income to plant trees. They also

protect your privacy, they do not store your searches permanently, they do not sell your data to advertisers, all your searches are encrypted, and they do not use external tracking tools which other internet search engines do. They don't use third-party trackers, in order to prevent others from accessing your searches. They only collect a small amount of data to be able to improve their services and if you want to opt out of this tracking you can activate "Do Not Track" in your browser's settings.

Currently our empty toner cartridges end up in landfill but recently we came across a charity called "Cartridges4Charity" (<https://cartridges4charity.co.uk/>) who will collect the empty cartridges and use them to generate funds for the "Against Malaria Foundation".

The changes we have made in the Group Office maybe small and may not seem very significant but believe me every change we make does make a difference and remember —

"If you think you are too small to make a difference, try sleeping with a mosquito" (Dalai Lama).

Reverend Ernest Green

We are sorry to learn in the Hempnall Group of the death on 2 September of the Rev'd Ernest Green, who was our Team Rector and Incumbent from 1991 to 1996. Many will remember Ernest - and his wife Dorothy (who was herself ordained as a priest while here and who sadly died last year) - with respect and affection. Ernest was a very good 'all-rounder' as Rector, being interested and skilled in various aspects of Church life - worship and liturgy, pastoral care and sound governance. He had a clear eye for detail. Sometimes he could appear to be austere but was actually quite shy and very kind. And he had a dry sense of humour: Jackie Mahony remembers hearing gales of laughter during some of Ernest's meetings with Conal as Team Vicar and Michael Windridge as Curate.

On their retirement from the Hempnall Group Ernest and Dorothy moved to Cheddar and then to Bristol, becoming members of a large city church where during the pandemic Ernest led 'streamed' weekday Morning Prayer services and hosted Sunday morning after-church chat on Zoom. Ernest's funeral will be held there on 30 September.

We give thanks for Ernest's long, rich ministry in the Church and remember his family in our prayers at this time - his children Andrew, Stephen, Julie and Ruth, his grandchildren and great grandchildren. A card has been sent to them with love on behalf of the Group.

Our flu vaccination season set off to a great start with our vaccine being delayed in September, but on writing this article (early September) we are optimistic that we will be able to go ahead with our pre-booked appointment clinics on Saturday 2nd and Saturday 9th October at Long Stratton Surgery, and on Wednesday 13th October at Newton Flotman Surgery.

The new eligible group of 50-64 year olds have been confirmed as continuing for the 21-22 flu season, and we will be notifying patients by eligibility in stages.

Our clinics will operate with social distancing and infection control measures in place. Please wear a mask, use the hand sanitiser and arrive only at your pre-booked appointment time as the waiting area space is limited. Please do not attend with a family member that does not have an appointment unless they are your carer, or you need assistance in some way.

For your information these are the eligible groups (cohorts).

- All children aged 2 to 15 (but not 16 years or older) on 31 August 2021 (2 & 3yr olds will be vaccinated at the practice)
- Those aged 6 months to under 50 years in clinical risk groups
- Pregnant women
- Those aged 50 years and over
- Those in long-stay residential care homes
- Carers
- Close contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- Frontline health and social care staff employed by:
 - A registered residential care or nursing home
 - Registered domiciliary care provider
 - A voluntary managed hospice provider
- Direct Payment (personal budgets) and/or Personal Health Budgets, such as Personal Assistants.

Eligible criteria have changed over the years so if you are unsure whether you are entitled to a vaccination please speak to our Reception Team who will check and confirm for you.
