
Saints', Hordle and St. Andrew's, Tiptoe

treasurer as many people bake as their way of saying goodbye. However overall we have made small profits contributed to some new kitchen equipment and tablecloths.

Our bakers and contributors of food have done us proud as always and enhanced our reputation. Often the family would like a theme; a flower, a colour, a cake or sweet which was a favourite, we always provide this if we can.

Thanks and praise is always abounding; sometimes leading to pleas to provide catering for other occasions but only one or two 'in house' events have seen the team jump into action. 'Team' is the word, the kitchen is amazing a hub of efficient business. But we cannot, and would not wish , to call ourselves a 'business' even if we provide a spread for over 100 [people which would never make a profit!

One interesting point is the development of encouraging families to bring items for a 'memories table'. Which helps people to remember in their own way their relationship with the deceased. Apart from photographs - even of the dog - and items such as knitting, tapestry, lace, paintings, and garden tools, it is always good to have souvenir items from family events and past gatherings to promote .

WORLD MISSION

The parish continues to support the Bible Society, The Leprosy Mission, Tearfund, Mission Aviation Fellowship and the Anglican Diocese of Butare in Rwanda.

Giving to Mission – the amount given in 2019 was £8,792. This figure includes the (non-covenanted) collection on Mission Sundays, the Lent Project and the November Gift 'Days'.

The gift for Rwanda, £1,810 was split equally between Butare where it will support their Centre for Training Young People, and the Lyndhurst Deanery projects.

NEW FOREST BASICS BANK

P SICS

Over the last year we have been collecting tins and packets of food for the local Basics Bank. The Basics Bank is run from the rear of the United Reformed Church in Lymington and supplies a food box each week to needy families who have been nominated by local Social Services, Citizen's

The certificates giving details of the twinned toilets are now displayed in our toilets. Toilet twinning enables communities in the poorest countries to be provided with the basic essentials in life such as a toilet, clean water and hygiene education.



CHURCH MAINTENANCE



'The wheels on the bus go round and round, all day long'. The Church 'bus' has its wheels kept revolving by the wonderfully generous giving of time, expertise and financial sums from a splendid band of volunteers.

Judith Rice has cleaned the churches week in week out; many flower arrangers have created magnificent displays; the Sanctuary Guild have polished, 'dressed' and provided; Philip Andrews has planted flower tubs; Bill Petts has mown

Church and Church Cottage grass; Sam McCleod has kept the Memorial Garden immaculate and Clive Stickland has kept the wider churchyard in an attractive manner; Charlie Rodgers has repaired the Lych-gate latch; Graham White has levelled up pathways; David Moynagh has re-vitalised door closures; Mike Peace, Anthea Fisher and Philip Hollowday have painted the Memorial Hall; Tim Cosby has attended to hedges and trees; Ed Hood, John Shea and Mike Peace have re-covered Memorial Hall chairs; and Andy Booth has inspired and headed up several outdoor work parties in various locations. Many others have also made precious contributions that are all greatly appreciated and I thank each and every one of you.

Apart from the 'usual routine maintenance and upkeep' of church fabric, various other matters have been addressed, many of which are still on-going due to regulations, time taken to crystalize ideas and challenges to be overcome.

At All Saints':- it is hoped soon to install a swing away boom arm for the projector; replacing the main entrance doors and generally upgrading the 'Front of House' is being considered; there is the possibility of placing a 'Solar Roof' on the southern roof elevation.

At St Andrew's:- several apertures under the eaves have been 'grilled' to prevent nesting; exfoliating brickwork is being debated by architects with a groundwater hole dug and cavity wall exploration undertaken; new internal lighting was installed over the coffee / social area; upgrading the refreshment / kitchen area is under consideration.

Hordle Church Car Park:- lining parking slots was debated; the hedge has been further 'thinned and trimmed'.

Memorial Hall:- a new gas boiler was installed, paid for by one very generous donation; there is the possibility of placing Solar Panels on the southern roof elevation; a strobe emergency light has been fitted in the disabled toilet and the kitchen hatchway fire-shutter investigated; the walls have been painted; a Velux window-opener has been replaced; some 50+ chairs are being re-covered and 'foot-checked'.

Overall we are greatly blessed to have so many useful, quality facilities in good order and our grateful thanks go to all who contribute so much in various ways (financial, time, equipment, expertise etc) to continually maintain and enhance them.

PARISH OFFICE



Together with admin for weddings, baptisms, and funerals, and much of the church publicity material, many of the church rotas are maintained from the office. Every week we produce the service and notice sheets for all our services, including Tiptoe this year, and prepare the projector slides for the

10.15 service and now also the revolving visual notices. We email out a draft of service sheets on Wednesdays and print the final version on Fridays. Thank you to everyone who act as our eagle-eyed proof readers, to minimize mistakes.

We also take bookings for the Memorial Hall and have just taken on running the bookings for Tiptoe Church Hall too.

This year we have implemented a Parish Publicity Plan. This splits our publicity into 'Outward Facing' documents that are intended for public consumption, and 'Inward Facing' documents that are intended primarily for the Church Family. A special thank you to Rebecca Emery, who creates all the wonderful graphics that we use on our posters, flyers, invitations, websites and Facebook.

Our main Outward Facing documents for new commers, are the Welcome Pack, Church Calendar, Church in Action Report, and the monthly Link Magazine. Together, these tell newcomers who we are, what we do, what is coming up and what has happened. Later on, if someone becomes regular, they are given a GDPR form, an Electoral Roll, and the Gifting Pack. Posters, emails, Facebook posts, My ChurchSuite, the Parish Website, and a double-page spread in the Horlde Village Magazine complete the outward facing documents.

Through ChurchSuite, our database system, we can target publicity at specific groups of people to maximise our reach. We now have nearly 500 people on our database (who have all used our churches in some capacity over the last 2 years) with whom we can communicate, and Facebook gives us reach to over 1000 others.

While we are talking numbers, we estimate that about 1,200 eparate individuals visited services at our churches over the 2019 Christmas period. Some attended more than one service over that period. That is an increase of about 200 on the previous year.

Thank you also to Timothy Rice, who maintains and updates the Parish website week by week.

Thank you also to those people who look after the office when we are on holiday, off sick, or need cover for meetings, and those who help by folding, stapling, and cutting when necessary. Without them, things would grind to a halt.

And thank you especially to the small, but dedicated, band of voluntary hall cleaners who keep the place so clean and welcoming. If you fancy a free workout, come and spend a couple of hours cleaning the hall once a month. Your participation will be gratefully accepted.
