Hello Everyone

Life doesn't stand still! As we are all aware, both the Government and the Church of England are constantly updating their guidelines for how we live and worship in order to stay safe, and we do our best to keep up with current regulations. With the continuing need to take care, this means that our Christmas worship services will be different from previous occasions, but at least we will be able to meet together in church, all being well, which is a big step forward from Easter when all our services in church were cancelled.

While life round us is changing, we are called to change from within too. As disciples of Christ, we grow from being babes to mature adults, as Paul bluntly described to the Corinthian Christians:

And so, brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. (1 Cor 3: 1-3a).

He was referring especially to rifts and quarrelling. But the principle applies to all our behaviour as we learn to live together and grow in maturity, as we understand the ways that Jesus showed us of how to live according to God's holy will. The straightforward version comes in the Ten Commandments, the complicated version comes in the 613 commandments followed by traditional Jews today, and the simple and most effective version comes in Jesus' Summary of the Law: you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' and 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself. Mark 12:29-31.

As we think ahead to a different Christmas when we may not see each other as much as we would like, and gifts are not so easy to exchange, maybe we can think how we can share this gift of love with our families, friends and neighbours, especially through prayer. In doing so, we will mature and become more like Christ each day.

A Plain Person's Guide to the Apostles Creed - 4



I Believe he suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

The cruel and savage death by crucifixion of an innocent person who had never committed any sin sits right at the centre of the Christian story.

The mention of Pontius Pilate, Roman governor of Judea from AD 26-36, provides historical context for the execution. Jesus' death was no accident but a conscious part of his purpose. He alluded to his death many times and clearly predicted it when speaking to his closest disciples. The picture of a suffering servant from Isaiah 53 provides a clear insight into the death of Jesus. The prophet spells out the spiritual meaning of his death, bearing the punishment for sin - not his sin, but ours. All human beings have sinned and turned away from God but because of the cross we can be reconciled to him through repentance and faith. Many volumes have been written on the cross, but essentially it was the supreme act of God's love for us.

Apostle Paul suggests there are only two human responses to the cross: for those who don't believe it seems like foolishness, but for those who believe it is the power of God bringing salvation. Because of this, when we believe in and trust in Christ we need have no fear of death because he has overcome death for us.

Life is short, make the most of it, put God first, love deeply, forgive quickly, laugh a lot, find and live out your purpose.

APCM REPORT 22nd September 2020

These meetings took place on Zoom and 44 people managed to log in.

The Annual Meeting of Parishioners elected Gill Morris and Duncan Argyle to stand as Church Wardens for the forthcoming year.

The Annual Parish Church Meeting approved the minutes of last year's meeting.

The following were elected to serve on the PCC: Anthea Fisher, Roger Freeman, Davina Griffiths, Ed Hood, Richard Nunn, Alastair Pickburn. One third of the PCC now represents Tiptoe and two thirds Hordle.

The following were elected to the Deanery Synod: Ian Andrews, Andrew Franklin, Martin Scott.

The Electoral Roll now stands at 154.

The Annual Report and Financial Statement had been available for four weeks prior to the meeting.

The Church in Action Booklet describes all the activities of the church and is well worth a read to see all that is going on! It is available on-line and in both churches.

Andrew Franklin, the Treasurer, made the following comments on the church finances:

In 2019 the Income was similar to that of 2018 at 159K.

Expenditure was down from £185K in 2018 to £166K in 2019 as there was little in the way of major repairs in 2019.

The PCC was able to meet its increased commitment to the Common Mission Fund of £90K (previously known as Parish Share) although this figure is still below the Diocesan recommendation. Andrew reminded everyone that it costs about £3,000 a week to run both churches and he is very grateful to those who give by regular planned giving as it makes it possible to budget more effectively. Signing a Gift Aid declaration increases the value of the gift by 25%. He was concerned when in 2019 a few generous givers moved away or died, but this shortfall has been made up by new people in the congregation and others increasing their giving.



Andrew reminded us that we can never outgive God the Father or God the Son, as God so loved the world that he gave his only Son and Jesus gave everything, including his life, on the cross.

Andrew pointed out that usually nearly all our income is from personal giving but since March ALL our income has been from personal giving as we have not been able to hire out our halls. Even though the buildings have been closed the church is very much alive and the PCC is grateful to all who have continued to give this year. He is hopeful we can meet our commitment to the CMF by the end of the year.

Andrew thanked all those who help him with the finances week by week.

It had been pointed out to the Standing Committee that there was a new requirement to have a safeguarding report in the Annual Report. The meeting was told this would be rectified and the Annual Report re-issued to the Charity Commission.

The fabric report of All Saints' and St Andrew's is in the Church in Action booklet but Duncan read it out and also said it is great to be part of a delightful team and thanked everyone for their time, energy and expertise in helping him fulfil his role.

The Vicar expressed his gratitude for the love, fellowship and support that he had received over the past 12 years in the parish of Hordle and Tiptoe. He stressed the need for a focus on unity and prayer as the parish goes forward into the Interregnum.

Tim Cosby has given us another varied diet of After-Service interviews ...

Tim Billington spoke to us about his early experience of faith when living in East Africa with his missionary parents. One example was when prayer was answered for his father when he needed to return to the UK, urgently, because his mother was seriously ill. The airline held the plane so that he could catch the only flight to London.

Tim spoke of very happy memories of working as a GP in the Lordshill area of Southampton and he went on to encourage us all, of a 'certain generation', to share our life experiences and what God has done in our lives, with the younger generation.

Tim talked with great joy and passion about **his work as a Street Pastor** in Southampton. He had many stories to recount.

Tim has been involved with other Christian outreach work all his life including Scripture Union beach missions. He has also been involved, latterly, with setting up Discipleship Training in Southampton among the student population. He spoke about his experiences as a Radio Solent doctor where he learnt to explain issues clearly.

Tim finished by urging all of us to be aware of the importance of speaking to others about our faith in the 'first person' – 'us and not 'you'.

Nigel Cosby spoke about precision farming – the new Agricultural Revolution.

Nigel shared some sobering statistics about farming and global food requirements in the next 30 years. By 2050 the World will require an additional 70% extra food.

Labour efficiency has increased twenty-fold since the 1940s. During the War one farm labourer fed approximately five people. Today that figure has risen to 100, with the agricultural operative required to be very highly efficient in IT.

Precision Farming is, fundamentally, the use of GPS technology to control today's highly sophisticated farm machinery in order to gain the maximum results from every acre. The modern tractor or harvester, fitted with this guidance based technology, can operate to within an accuracy of ten millimetres. Hence the incredibly straight lines that we may notice in large fields of crops.

Nigel spoke about the highly technical area of green pea production for processing. GPS guided harvesting machinery, costing over £400,000 per unit, can be controlled with huge accuracy. This is highly weather and time critical— quite literally, a crop can spoil within a few hours if weather or conditions prevent harvesting. The next time you buy a bag of frozen peas think Precision Farming!

Revd Nicky Lee is a member of the **Holy Trinity Brompton** clergy team. He came to faith, together with his, now, wife Sila before they married. Having joined HTB, he worked for a while as a teacher, then went on to be ordained in 1985. and joined the clergy team at HTB.

Alpha, Nicky told us, started in a very small way but rapidly grew after Nicky Gumbel took over its development in 1990. The Nickys have since grown to be firm friends. Alpha is now used by churches and Christian organisations worldwide. It has been translated into 112 languages.

Nicky and Sila have been very involved in the development of the Marriage Course and founded the organisation - Relationship Central.

Nicky also told us about the concept of Church Plants that HTB have developed. Simon Robertson, who served his curacy at Hordle and Tiptoe, moved on to an HTB plant church in Andover. The earliest plant that HTB developed was in Brighton. When the idea of some of the HTB team moving to Brighton to take over a redundant church and reopen it, everyone thought they were 'crazy'. "Who would want to go to Brighton to do this?" This church has now grown to be extremely successful. This encouraged HTB to set up plants all over the South of England from Plymouth to Brighton. Locally we have Lovechurch in Bournemouth.

Such plants are welcomed by central church leadership as they create revival. Their members often go on to join other local churches and generate growth. The style of these Plants often appeals to new church goers as they start their Christian life.

David Robinson, of Searchlight Theatre Company, spoke about the problems that live performers and theatres are experiencing during the Covid crisis. He recalled bringing *Would You Adam and Eve it?* to Ashley so successfully in June last year.

In his 32 years in the Performing Arts, David has experienced nothing like this current crisis. He and Michael were furloughed in March but are now returning to work. They have to be very creative and find new ways to communicate with their audiences.

Christmas should be the busiest time for a Christian Theatre Group. David and Michael are currently working on a number of online and filmed ventures. Among these are a short series of presentations entitled *The Most Wonderful Time of the Year*. These will highlight both the joys of Christmas and some of the attendant pressures and stresses.

However, David pointed out that nothing can match real live theatre and the relationship between performers and their audience. David and Michael plan to bring their highly successful *Screwtape Letters* presentation back to the stage as soon as possible in 2021. They are also compiling a post-Christmas online service — with a difference — aimed at relieving some of the burden that clergy feel after the main event is over.



Thoughts from my Garden ...

We had some really beautiful weather in September. I got up early one morning to go shopping just as the sun was rising and it was worth the effort. This morning, it was still dark when I got up but it is nice to get the shopping done early ... and every week is a week nearer Spring!

My butternut squash have done well this year - I have picked 35 fruits, not very big ones but about 1lb in weight. They make good soup and keep well with their tough skins. I suppose I should have removed more of them early on, then they would have grown bigger! I nearly pulled up the French beans a few weeks ago, but I noticed some flowers, so I left them and have picked a lot more since. It is mid-October and there are still a few little ones growing. I will grow them again next year as I have enjoyed them.

The birds are enjoying the fat balls I put out, with the ground-feeding birds clearing the bits which fall. Sparrows are the main feeders at the moment and a few blue tits. I look forward to seeing more birds, usually long-tailed tits come and feed.

I had an encounter with a robin. I was sat on the ground amongst flowers, doing some weeding, when he came and joined me, perching really close, even using the lace knot on my shoe as a perch. It is such a privilege to be so close to God's creatures and see how beautiful they are. I know robins are very protective of their chosen garden. I did witness a fight between two robins with one ending up on it's back. I was watching from the garage and was just about ready to interfere, when it flew away, chased by the other one!

One year, there was a friendly robin at St. Andrew's Church, which would come into the service if the door was open!


