Let me share with you the Bidding Prayer I used at every carol service I led when in schools.

Let us hear again the message of the angels that He had come to bring peace to all men and let us pray for peace in our troubled world today.

Let us join those who first worshipped the Christ child. We are none of us too poor, or lowly or stupid; it was the shepherds who saw Him first. We are none of us too great, or learned, or rich; it was the wise men who came next and offered gifts. We are none of us too young; it was the little children who first laid down their lives for Him; or too old, for Simeon saw and recognised Him.

There is only one thing against most of us - we are too proud.

So let us go to Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass and the Babe lying in a manger."

So as we worship at Christmas, be it in church, on Zoom, on TV or wherever, may this message warm our hearts and lighten what has been a dark year.



A Plain Person's Guide to the Apostles Creed - 5



I Believe.....On the third day he rose again;

When Jesus was taken down from the cross he was dead. The fact was attested by the Roman authorities present at the cross and to make absolutely sure a spear was driven into his trunk - a wound that under normal circumstances would have been sufficient to kill a man. He was laid in a tomb and a large stone placed to seal it, but three days later the tomb was empty and he was seen alive by most of his close friends, his brother and 500 people gathered at one time.

However it is not these biblical accounts alone, nor the number of references in the Apostles' letters to Jesus' resurrection that convince us that this is factual, but that for two millennia Christians have experienced *"new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead"* as the writer to the Hebrews tells us. Or as the Apostle Peter puts it, *"as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life"*. The resurrection of Jesus speaks of God's power to defeat humanities' last and final enemy – death. *"Thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."*.

In November, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York wrote a joint letter to the Nation. For reasons of space, this is a very slightly abbreviated version of their letter ...



Dear Friends, These are deeply challenging and difficult times for us all.

When we are surrounded by fear and suffering, it can be hard to feel hopeful. This coming winter feels like it will be longer and darker than usual. There is a story in the Bible where Jesus and his disciples are caught in a storm. The disciples are understandably terrified as the wind and waves threaten to overpower them. 'Why are you so afraid?', Jesus asks. This year, we too have been caught in a storm which often feels overwhelming. And yet we can look to Jesus, in the boat with us, who calms the storm and comforts us in our fear.

We are writing to share our belief that whoever you are, and whatever you happen to believe, you are loved by God. Beyond measure. We also want you to know that we are praying for you, particularly asking that Christ's love will comfort us, calm our fears, and lead our nation and our world through this terrible pandemic.

Starting this week, we have asked every church to pray each day at 6pm. We invite you to join with us. There are three other responses that we want to encourage everyone to consider - **First, let's be calm**. By only buying what we need and not hoarding, or by reaching out to our neighbours as we did during the first lockdown, we can be stronger together in ways that are impossible if we go it alone. When things go wrong - as they always will with such complex challenges - let us look for good and right ways forward together. **Secondly, let's be courageous.** There are many reasons to be fearful at the moment, but the story of Christ calming the waves calls us to give our fears to Jesus and have faith in Him. The British willingness just to get on with things is one of our very best characteristics – let us not be paralysed by fear. We will all need each other's courage in the months to come. **Thirdly, let's be compassionate**. So many of us are holding so much pain - our own and the pain of those we love. We will need to be gentle, kind and patient with each other. In the first wave we showed we are a nation of compassion and kindness. Let's dig deep and keep that love for our neighbours strong in this second time of struggle. Even though there is much darkness around us, there are also many points of light in the weeks ahead.

Soon it will be Christmas. At his birth Jesus was also called Emmanuel. It's a word that appears in lots of carols. It means 'God is with us'. And this is the message of Christmas: in Jesus, God is with us, sharing our darkness and our struggles, bringing comfort and joy. It is the source of our hope. As the Bible says: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5) Let us shine in the darkness of this winter.

May God bless you and keep you, and all those you love.

Report from Standing Committee

The present financial situation will not allow for the budgeted amount of £90,000 to be paid to the Diocese for the Common Mission fund. The PCC will need to decide in December how much can be paid, possibly nearer £80,000.

In preparation for the Parish profile the PCC members were asked to write in with their thoughts on the potential attributes of a new vicar. These have been collated and will be discussed at the January PCC.

The Parish Mission Action plan is being updated and will be discussed in December.

A new Church of England Safeguarding policy is to be approved by PCC.

The continued upkeep of the church buildings and surrounds continues to keep Duncan and his helpers busy.

The Christmas services and other initiatives for the community are all in hand and eagerly anticipated following the excellent Remembrance Day on-line service.

Tim Cosby has given us another varied diet of After-Service interviews ...

Andrew Franklin is known to us as our efficient and hard-working treasurer. But before retirement he was Director of Finance and Administration at the Anglican Communion in London, the most interesting and rewarding job he had in his life.

He spoke of fond memories of well known people, including Archbishops Carey, Williams and Tutu. He said they are just ordinary people called to serve God in their own particular way.

The Anglican Communion is, effectively, the Global Anglican Church of which there are approximately 80 million members. 165 countries are members of 40 'Provinces'. The Church of England is one Province, as is the Episcopal Church of America and the Church of Ireland. The Archbishop of Canterbury is seen as 'the first among many' and as such does not hold a position of 'seniority'. The whole concept of the Communion is – 'Unity and not Uniformity'.

Andrew also spoke of his memories of travelling and visiting other churches abroad. He remembers being greatly moved by the joy and exuberance displayed in the worship of a congregation in South Africa. In his opinion the centre of the Anglican Church is now in South Africa.

David Gibbons, Regional Manager, Southern England, Operation Christmas Child spoke about the 'Shoebox' campaign. Shoebox was started in 1990 by David Cook and has grown into a massive global outreach. During this period 178 million gifts have been made to children in 160 countries. The Mission Statement is: 'Good News Great Joy'.

These shoeboxes, in many cases, is the only time these children will ever receive gift.

The organisation works with local Christian groups to distribute the gifts and also encourages the children to then join the Greatest Journey training. Through 12 fun and interactive lessons taught by teachers within their communities and churches, children discover who Jesus is, the hope He brings and the importance of sharing their faith in Christ with family and friends. More than 14.9 million children have enrolled in this programme since 2009. Often whole families come to know the Lord as a result of the gifts being given to their children.

David confirmed that the £5 donation to be included in the Shoebox is used to cover all admin and distribution costs involved.

Other support offered by Samaritan's Purse includes donations to over 400 churches in the UK as well as provision of field hospitals for Covid treatment in Italy and New York.





Bob Bartlett, Vice Chairman, Hampshire Royal British Legion spoke to us about the Legion's work and the way that Covid has seriously impacted on the charity this year.

Set up in 1921, next year's centenary celebrations are currently on hold. A Royal Charter was bestowed in the 1970s. 99% of the trustees are volunteers who form the core of the Legion.

In 2019 the Legion raised £100m with half of this coming from the community through Poppy Appeal etc. This year Bob expects the funds raised to be less than half of that and the Legion will be relying more than ever on its corporate sponsors.

Five years ago, due to the proliferation of charities seeking to raise funds in this area, Veteran's Gateway was formed to take overall control of all service related charities. It provides a one stop call centre and management to ensure a speedy and efficient support system for both serving and retired personnel when a need arises.

Bob is a member of the Legion's Riders' Branch which is a nationwide group of motor cycle enthusiasts. Dressed in their leathers with shiny bikes they attend a whole range of events encouraging support for the Legion.

He referred to his own Naval career as a submariner and spoke of his immense respect for our armed forces. He spoke about the traumatic situations that service people often cope with in their work and the real need to support them.

Finally Bob spoke about the way that the Armed Services have been involved in the current Pandemic situation in building Nightingale Hospitals, operating Track and Trace testing facilities. Also many medical staff have been working in the NHS.
