A Plain Person's Guide to the Apostles Creed - 6



I believe ... he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

To sit at the right hand of an earthly king was a place of honour, denoting special trust, authority from, and relationship with, the monarch. Following his earthly ministry, his crucifixion and death-defying resurrection, Jesus went to be in his Father's presence. It is being in that sublime presence that is described as heaven. God the Father, as the Apostle Paul states, "exalted Jesus to the highest place"

It is from this place of purity and light that Jesus was appointed the judge of each individual. The basis of this judgement will be our answer to the question, "do you love Christ or reject him?" for we are told:

"there is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus". On the cross Jesus has taken the once and for all punishment for sin. He did this because he "loved the world so much". We don't deserve this love, but we are invited to respond to it in repentance, faith and trust in Christ. This should lead us to compassionate concern and love for others and a willingness to share the "good news" about Jesus. "He will judge the world in righteousness and the peoples in his faithfulness".

Recently Tim Cosby has hosted many guests via our Sunday Zoom chats ...

In late November Reverend Canon Don Binder, Chaplain to the Archbishop of Jerusalem and the Middle East, spoke about the work of the Church in that region. He anticipated celebrating our Lord's birth with lights and decorations. He also spoke of the severe stresses that are rife due to the regional political situation combined with the Pandemic.

In early Advent we met The **Reverend Canon Robert Titley**, Canon Treasurer at Salisbury Cathedral, who spoke about his work with the Cathedral's 'treasures', primarily it's people. His wish is to use the Cathedral's history for the whole community. Robert recognises a benefit that has come from Coronavirus – greater use of the internet to reach out to people.

Following the Christingle service, a very special guest unexpectedly joined us from the North Pole. He shared some of the secret knowledge, known only to himself and his elves, with those who would be eagerly hanging up their stockings on Christmas Eve.

Continuing our local cathedral theme, we met The **Reverend Canon Andy Trenier**, Precentor and Sacrist at Winchester Cathedral. Andy spoke about his duties in presenting worship, explaining that the Cathedral has invested in new technology (due to a very generous gift) which enables them to broadcast worship to a very high standard.

Following the Christmas break we began a theme of personal testimonies focussing on the importance of the Bible to our guests. From Hordle, Elizabeth Wyatt, Senior Partner with Anthony Collins Solicitors LLP joined us. Liz spoke of her teenage journey to faith and of the Lord's blessing in enabling her to join a Christian firm. She derives encouragement from scripture and emphasised the importance of being part of a strong church. She feels a supportive Home Group is important in maintaining a rewarding Christian life.

The **Reverend Paul Cowley**, MBE spoke about his autobiography, *Thief, Prisoner, Soldier, Priest* which charts his life from a harsh and deprived childhood to ordained ministry at Holy Trinity Brompton and his work in rehabilitating offenders. He spoke with great candour about his problematic life until he met Christ through an Alpha Course. He then spoke about his work in prisons and with ex-offenders. Paul is in such a good position to reach out to bring the Good News of Christ to these marginalised people.

Jane Boswell, Church Engagement Officer with Tearfund, joined us to speak about the growth of her faith, from being brought up in a Christian home to her faith developing during university years. She then worked in Ethical Fund management before taking a Masters' Degree, which brought her into matters of environmental sustainability. Joining Tearfund in 2017, she now focusses on environmental issues which affect God's Creation.

Prayer and Worship at home

Reading a Bible passage daily can keep us in touch with God and other Christians and some of us have notes which help us to keep our commitment, enlighten us as to the meaning of what we read and stimulate our thoughts. That short time given sets us up for the day. I use paper notes now, but I also use an app called 'Bible'. Church House Publishing have issued the Psalms as an app with thoughtful notes.

If you like to put yourself into a Bible story in your imagination and reflect on it, then you could try www.taketime.org.uk .

This week I read something about prayer, saying 'some people like to pray in silence and some people like to pray with words', and I want to add 'some people like to pray with other people's words'.

While we have been locked down with Covid we have found ways to worship at home. Even when there have been Sunday services in Church not everyone has been able to return; you may have found a service from a web site or on television, but for some that isn't possible. Worship, as a form of service, relies on words, often familiar words which we share with the church family. Reading the words of the service may be important for you, and if it is, please ask Rev Anne Elliott, Ian Andrews or me to lend you a copy of Common Worship Morning and Evening Prayer (the thin green book). If you can get on line then look for 'Daily Prayer' and 'Time to Pray' (the logo just says 'Pray' - this one can be heard too!) both are published by CHP.

It may be that by the time you read this we are getting back to 'normal' services, but these are good at home at any time!

Dear God ...

Dear God ...

I'm beginning to see you in the natural things around, the things you made. I've realised I have to set aside time for thinking about you and talking with you, but I'm not so good at keeping my mind on what I'm there for - you.

Dear Carolyn ...

There is a little phrase which is worth remembering, 'Be still and know that I am God'. Use that phrase to remind you how you might keep your thoughts on me.

When you give the time, firstly you need to be still in body, supported and comfortable on a chair. Be relaxed in every part of you. If you find it difficult then tense and relax each muscle in turn - be sure you end with 'relax'!

Notice the rhythm of your breathing without becoming over-conscious of it - you can't be still without breathing, but doing this helps to still your mind, which is the second thing. 'Be still' means body and mind.

Now remind yourself of why you are doing this, repeat the phrase 'Be still and know that I am God' It reminds you of your part and mine, yours is 'Be still and know...', mine is 'I am God'.

I usually dig them out of the garden in the Autumn and plant wallflowers, but because of circumstances last Autumn, I missed the wallflower plants. I will miss their wonderful scent on warm spring days but I do hate having to remove them while they are still in flower to put in fresh plants. Sometimes, I have left the bushy ones in as I do find they flower earlier than the ones planted in the Autumn.

I did make a trip to a garden centre before the present lockdown, thinking they were going to close, which they haven't, and stocked up on seeds and seed potatoes. Last year seeds become short during the first lockdown - I think people were keen to grow their own vegetables.

The strawberry runners I potted up last year are now potted on and in the greenhouse, hopefully to produce some early fruit. Sorry birds, but I am not growing any outside this year!

I have appreciated having lots of vegetables in the freezer, like French beans, peppers, broad beans etc. Added to rice, with a piece of fish, these make a good meal. We still have some cabbage and leeks in the garden and we have had two feeds of purple sprouting. Luckily they are staked and I have only had to upright one or two after the gales, usually just because the twine has broken.

I hope the rain eases a bit soon, as the ground is quite wet, too wet to get on, but then the sun will come out and dry everything, until we are asking for rain! Gardeners are never satisfied!
