# New Year's Resolutions

January is traditionally a time for New Year's resolutions – did you make one, and have you kept it so far?

These are people's favourites:

- Lose weight
- Make more time for the family
- Spend money wisely
- Read more
- Drink less alcohol

But how about making a New Year's resolution to care more for our world and creation?

We are facing not just a climate crisis, but interlinked climate, biodiversity and pollution crises. The biggest impacts on all these are (i) burning coal, oil and gas (ii) industrial agriculture (iii) destruction of ecosystems and (iv) excess waste.

As Christians we believe God created the world and told us to look after it.

*'The Lord God put humankind in Eden 'to serve it and keep it'.  
Genesis 2:15*

There are lots of small things we can do to care for our world. Carbon dioxide from burning fossil fuels – coal, oil and gas – is the biggest cause of global heating. To conserve energy we can...

- Limit our electricity use. Turn lights off and use low energy light bulbs (LEDs use least) and don't leave appliances on stand-by. Turn down the thermostat. Draught-proof windows and doors.
- Save and cherish water
- Use water butts

Scientists calculate that one third of global heating arises from food production; rainforests are cut down to grow animal feed; industrial fishing empties the oceans; fertilizer and pesticide run-off makes waterways barren, and industrial farming turns rich soil to barren dirt. Methane from cattle and sheep farming is a potent greenhouse gas.

### What can we do?

- Use your LOAF! Buy and grow some food that follows the 'LOAF' principles for food: Locally produced, Organically grown, Animal friendly and Fairly traded.
- Eat more plant-based foods.
- Try to buy British fruit and veg in season and support local shops.
- Take reusable bags to the shops or your own container when you buy takeaway food.

Deforestation and loss of biodiversity are caused by the harvest of ever greater quantities of the raw materials for clothing. Clothing production uses 79 trillion litres of water every year. Chemicals used in clothing production cause pollution and are harmful to factory workers. Cheap clothes often mean bad working conditions and low pay for factory workers. Waste from fast fashion often ends up on landfill. Synthetic fabrics do not biodegrade and shed microplastics which pollute land and sea.

What can we do?

- Repair, re-use, borrow or share rather than buying new
- Buy second-hand
- Keep your clothes for longer and give away anything you haven't worn for years
- Learn to sew and mend your clothes.
- Use biodegradable washing powder/liquid

These are maybe just a few ideas for ways we can help to protect our planet now and for future generations.

The American evangelist Billy Graham said *'When we fail to see the world as God's creation, we will end up abusing it. Selfishness and greed take over, and we end up not caring about the environment or the problems we're creating for future generations.'*

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

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


Fields in Trust is an independent charity with over 90 years' experience protecting parks and green spaces. They work with landowners, community groups and policy makers to champion the value of our parks and green spaces to achieve better protection for their future at both local and national level.

It has been proven, parks and green spaces help people stay physically and mentally well; places where we can all move, breathe, run and play. They are an important tool to drive social cohesion, combat loneliness and build community spirit.

Fields in Trust encourage Friends of Parks groups, or "Friends", local volunteers that have historically supported parks and acted as voluntary community custodians over their use; being fundraisers, influencers, conservationists, managers, and event organisers. They have also acted as the 'eyes and ears' of our parks when they come under threat or they're being mis-managed. Friends of groups are then often the glue that keeps many a park at their best, and the actions taken by these volunteers should be valued highly.



We can secure funding for the 'extra' bits in a park such as benches, bins or swings, getting more people using the park through events and physical improvements such as fences or planting are clear measures of impact, but how do we value the full contribution Friends make through their time and effort? It turns out that time volunteered is a tricky thing to quantify. Traditionally, volunteering value has been calculated by looking at the cost of replacing the volunteers with paid workers. In 2016, the national figure was estimated as £70m and the value of Friends volunteer hours have increased substantially over the last few years.

Unfortunately it's also been shown that the amount of time people volunteer in general is decreasing across the country. Volunteering is becoming more valuable, and sadly it may be getting rarer. Friends of groups are going to be crucial in developing the innovative new ways in

which our green spaces survive and thrive, and we could all do well to appreciate their time a little more, and perhaps join their ranks.

We can all celebrate our open green spaces in Biggin Hill, but your local Biggin Hill Friends of the Parks, working with Bromley Council and their contractors oversee The Rec, Sensory Garden, Mine Shaw, Kings Road Open Space and Jug Hill and we need your help to encourage, promote, maintain and to support us.

We need some help on our committee and to join us on volunteer days, the following are a few of the tasks we carry out.

Weeding, edging, pruning, clearing brambles, planting, litter picking, replacing post and rails, coppicing, bulb planting. If you feel you can contribute some help or want to brush up on your gardening skills, this is the place to come, as you will be given some excellent tuition. Tools, gloves are all supplied.

The Friends of Biggin Hill parks are a friendly but vital and passionate group of people that care for their environment and their community, but we desperately need your help. We meet every second Saturday of the month for a couple of hours to work at any one of the sites mentioned above.



Please do remember, if you live further way and cannot help Biggin Hill, consider helping your local group to look after your local parks, gardens, memorials, and open green spaces. They all desperately need help to keep them maintained.

# The boy who fled the Russians



This is Richard Geiger with his wife Pat. After secondary school in Strood, he trained as a graphic designer at the Gravesend School of Art and the Canterbury College of Art. Richard met his wife, Pat, at Gravesend, where she studied commercial design for 3 years.

Geiger, if you didn't know, means Fiddler, as in playing the fiddle. Yes, Geiger is a German name! His father, Eugen, was from

south Germany, the Stuttgart area; Richard's mother, Stella, came from Bushey in Hertfordshire. Both his parents were born around 1906-1908.

After school Stella worked for a while as a governess in a big house during the summer holidays. Here is an amazing literary connection: her employer was an old lady called Alice Liddell. In her childhood, Alice had known Lewis Carroll; he had taken a number of photos of her. During a boating trip Carroll told Alice a story; he turned this story into his 1865 novel, Alice's Adventures in Wonderland!

Originally from Swabia, Richard's father was an anglophile. Having completed his apprenticeship in engineering in Germany, and as there was no employment in engineering, he came to Pitman's in Hampstead to improve his English.

Stella loved German at school and became proficient, so in the mid-30s decided to go to Germany, explaining that she 'wanted to see what Mr. Hitler was getting up to.' So off she went to the historic city of Magdeburg, later flattened by the RAF and Americans, to teach English. Stella was a fine pianist and loved opera. One day Eugen and Stella saw each other at the opera, so he enrolled in her English classes. They married and set up house in Magdeburg. Stella's family wasn't too pleased, as Eugen was working as a draughtsman for Krupp, the famous engineering company and the main weapons manufacturer for Germany in both world wars. He carried on working for Krupp during the war, was therefore excused National Service. However, he knew all along the war wasn't going to go well for Germany.

Along came Richard in 1941, the youngest of the three. He remembers sleeping in the cellar of the house. Just before Liberation, he recalls the Americans coming through; the locals hung out white sheets. The only conflict in the Magdeburg area in the Old East Germany was when the Russians came through in 1945.

In that area people had been used to the Germans marching through, click click click, with their steel heeled boots. When the Americans came you heard nothing: their Doc Martens meant silence!

The family dynamics weren't that easy. Richard's brother Eugen was his mother's favourite. He did everything right. But Richard, the youngest, was the naughty one! He remembers his mother saying, 'You're a horrible boy. If the (deceased) twins had lived, I wouldn't have had you.' Richard remembers a Russian staff car coming by while he was swinging on the metal front gate. He picked up a stone and threw it at the car. The car stopped and an officer came up the garden path. His mother had a hard time pacifying him!

When the Russians came through, Richard's mother said, 'Oh Lord, that's all I need.' So she started to make plans to leave, but Richard's father would have to stay in Germany. In 1946 no Germans were allowed into England anyway.

A cousin collected a petition for the Home Office; the local MP for Hemel Hempstead was Lady Davidson. She brought up in Parliament the situation of this English-German family where the whole family was stuck in Germany. As a result of this, Richard's mother was given permission to enter England; however, they weren't allowed to leave East Germany. She went to see the Consul General of Magdeburg, a Russian. His reply was: 'Why do you want to leave with a Workers' Paradise being set up?'

After the war his mother had taken up the custom of giving tradesmen a Christmas box. One of these had access to a lorry that went to Berlin once a week. One day mother and the three children boarded the lorry, picking up other people as well. Richard remembers going through a German forest with pine trees on either side. During a comfort break in the forest, people suddenly emerged from the woods, also wanting to get on board. Even now going along a road with pine trees triggers this memory from when he was 6!

They reached Berlin and stayed with two Russian ladies, White Russians who had fled the Revolution and were living in a grand building which had not been destroyed. The family stayed for 2 days and then came the moment of truth: they went to Berlin Tempelhof airport, where they boarded a Dakota, as Richard recalls, standing nose up. He remembers looking at this aircraft and thinking, 'This is the highlight of my life.' He doesn't remember take-off, but does remember crossing the Channel. At this point


his mother was getting quite excited. They landed at RAF Northolt and went to live at Hemel Hempstead at the cousin's house who had been instrumental in their exit.

Then the family troubles really began. According to the Russian authorities, the family weren't meant to have left. His father, not having permission to come to England, kept on buying the same amount of goods with the ration books, then distributing the rest that he didn't need, but someone reported him. Richard's father was quizzed by the Russian authorities, who sentenced him to 2 years hard labour. He was used as slave labour on the building of a dam in the Harz mountains.

Meanwhile in England, Stella needed work and as she was unable to secure work in England, went to the Edinburgh High School for Boys to do teaching, taking the two eldest children with her. Richard was promptly put into a council-run children's home in Harpenden which, he says, was awful! At this stage he was aged 7. His mother found out the situation and managed to get all three children into West Lulworth Church of England children's home. This, Richard says, was the best time of his life! On the first night the lady who ran the home complimented Richard on the way he folded his clothes at bedtime!

The three of them went to the local school and at one point there was a county-wide painting competition by Brooke Bond Tea, which Richard won!

Richard's brother Eugen went back to Germany in 1959 where he still lives, and Elizabeth, his sister, became a teacher and lives in Leicester.

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# Happy New Year!

Thinking all things New Year and what 2024 might bring us, we were asked what would be our hopes for the community of Biggin Hill and how we could influence and make bring them to fruition.

Luke 10:22 - "You shall love the Lord your God ...and your neighbour as yourself", gave us the foundation of community thinking, and allowed us to compile the following things to concentrate on.

**Unity** – we would wish to bring all of the community together, building relationships, caring for each other and looking out for our neighbours!

We are actively involved in Safer Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. An arrangement of residents coming together and being on the lookout for each other. Think of it as a form of an added burglar alarm, CCTV, or ring doorbell system, but with a quicker response time? To run a Watch it would need someone to take control and feed out information received by email regarding scams, alerts, tips and ideas on keeping safe, not only at home, but also while out and about. Email, WhatsApp groups, text messages are all quick and easy ways to relay the information, and warn each other of suspicious things happening, but the old fashioned pen and paper is still an option.

**We hope that more willing residents will come forward and take responsibility of their own small community area/road/close/avenue, to make it safe for all.**

**Prosperity** – we have thriving hubs of shops and retailers throughout Biggin Hill, offering an array of goods and services. To use them means not to lose them!

We continue to fight against paid parking on Main Road, hikes in business rates and rents to landlords whilst being realistic of the need for all to cover costs. We promote small shopping parades and bid for grant funding to improve the areas. We get involved with litter picking, street sign cleaning and are forever using Fix My Street to get things done.

**We hope, that we all look to our local shops and retailers, before we buy on line?**
