Explaining a pantomime to an American...

Part of our family tradition is usually to go and see a pantomime at Christmas (oh yes we do!) This year's production at the Churchill theatre, *Jack and the Beanstalk*, was excellent. Have you ever tried explaining the concept of pantomime to an American? They don't have these shows in the States.

Here is the essence: the principal boy is played by a girl, but that doesn't mean the principal girl is played by a man; the dame is also played by a man, usually in outrageous clothing. Often two people dress up as an animal. Then there are certain stock phrases – 'he's behind you', 'oh yes you will'/'oh no you won't'. On top of this the audience is expected to participate. This is enough to confuse someone from outside the UK!

The wonderful thing about pantomime is that there is always a clear distinction between good and evil. Cheers for the 'good fairy' and boos and hisses for the evil character. In the end good always wins, and evil is overcome. Usually, a couple in the story find true love and they all live happily ever after.

Sadly, we don't always see this in real life. As we look back over last year, we see so much evil stalking the world: war, terrorism, atrocities, I could go on. One of people's favourite New Year's resolutions is to see peace in our world. Who wouldn't long to see that? It's something we pray for regularly in church.

Christmas gives us the wonderful and true story of a baby born to Mary in a stable. I'm sure many of us enjoyed watching nativity plays last month in December. Yet Jesus was born into the real world of Roman occupation, of King Herod the dictator who was notoriously cruel, ordering the massacre of children under 2 in Bethlehem. The parents of Jesus fled as refugees to Egypt when he was very young. Mary and Joseph knew what it was to be fearful as they protected their precious son.

In the church's year we have entered the season of Epiphany when we think about the light of Christ who came into our world. By various signs Jesus made himself known as the Son of God. Of course, light can shine into the darkest of places and can

reveal all sorts of dirt and mess. In the same way Jesus came to show us how we need to put our lives right with God. He came to show us what's wrong in our own lives, how we have all messed up.

Many people leave Jesus in the manger as a perpetual Peter Pan. But we all have to make a personal response to Jesus. The Wise Men came and worshipped Jesus, bringing Him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. They recognised Him as the Son of God. Do you also recognise Him for who He is, or have you put Him away with the Christmas decorations?

Conductor Felicity Cliffe brought a lively interpretation to some popular classics, including a selection from Cats, the Ukrainian Bell Carol, and two carols. A special word must go to David Chapman, who sang a brilliant solo of *O Holy Night*.

The concert was held in aid of St Christopher's Hospice. Anne Nash, Consultant Nurse at St Christopher's, explained that the Hospice has 30 inpatient beds. On the week of the concert,

they were supporting 1297 patients in the community. They cover 5 London boroughs: Bromley, Croydon, Lambeth, Lewisham and Southwark. The Hospice only receives one third of its funding from the NHS and needs to fund raise £18 million each year to



support its end of life and Bereavement services. The concert raised over £700

Christmas week

We began with our traditional Service of 9 Lessons and Carols, at which several members of the community read the birth narrative. On the Wednesday we held a Blue Christmas, with a reflective element. On the Thursday there was a Christmas Miscellany, an alternative carol service, with lesser-known carols and some well-rehearsed drama! On the Friday about

25 children attended Messy Church, while on Christmas Eve we had two very full Christingle services. Again, visitors attended the first Communion of Christmas at Midnight and yet others on Christmas Day itself. It was wonderful to welcome so many local people back after two years of uncertainty.

Fairtrade at St. Mark's



It was agreed at a PCC meeting some years ago that coffee, tea and sugar provided at St. Mark's should carry the Fairtrade label whenever possible. Neil & Chris Walker supply the church kitchen with these items. Please let them know if you see stocks running low. If for any reason you need to purchase these items for St. Mark's yourself please try to buy those with the Fairtrade logo.

FAIRTRADE is a different way of doing business and is a growing international movement for change. Fairtrade is about better prices, decent working conditions, local sustainability, and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world. By requiring companies to pay sustainable prices (which must never fall lower than the market price), Fairtrade addresses the injustices of conventional trade, which traditionally discriminates against the poorest, weakest producers. It enables them to improve their position and have more control over their lives.

With Fairtrade you have the power to change the world every day. With simple shopping choices you can get farmers in the developing world a better deal. And that means they can make their own decisions, control their future and lead the dignified life everyone deserves. There are many other products that are Fairtrade - please look out for them whenever you are shopping. They are often more expensive than similar products, but this reflects the fair price paid to the producers.

Winter Colour in the Garden -Beating The Blues

Many plants spend their winter dormancy building up reserves for the following summer, while others perform during the winter months, proving irresistible to us and our nature friends. Many of which are rated much higher than our well-known spring and summer counterparts, due to the time of



year. Cornus sanguinea 'Midwinter Fire' is one of many of the Cornus spp or dogwoods. Showing off their brightly coloured stem colours in the winter sun, the reds, lime greens to yellow and flame cheer up any dull corner. To ensure they achieve their goal, a third of the plant needs to be pruned each spring, with each stem down to two or three buds, encouraging new shoots, of which these will provide the rich colours the following winter.

Other plants take centre stage this time of year, as flowers bloom not only to provide colour but intoxicate the air with scent. The odd brave bee during mild spells investigates each individual flower in search for nectar. During extreme cold temperatures, some flowers do suffer and may become damaged, but there are plenty more buds waiting to open.





Viburnum farrei and V. bodnantense 'Dawn'. The former, a shell pink and slender shrub, the latter, a vigorous tall shrub with dark pink flowers, adorn the garden with its exotic fragrance, so too does the Mahonias as their yellow racemes rise above the foliage, particularly M.bealei, flowering after Christmas.



Well-known for its fragrance is the witchhazel, *Hamamelis spp*, their unusual spidery blossom exudes its intoxicating scent (almost too powerful at times). They are slow growing but will grow quite large eventually. Flowers range from yellow, orange to red during January and February. Will grow in most soils

but better in acidic soil.

The Queen of all winter fragrant shrubs is Daphne bholua 'Jacqueline Postill'. A slow grower but makes up for their exotic richly scented blooms among emerald, green leaves. It will eventually reach 150 to 200cms in 10 years, but certainly brings a cheer to a cold frosty morning.

The ground can be quite bare in winter, but there are several evergreen perennials that will not only cover but flower right through to spring. The Hellebore with its dark evergreen foliage opens to allow the flower stem to

break through and provide snow white, pinks and red, even yellow and green colours to the winter palate.

In the larger garden, small trees can make a dramatic effect in the garden, as seen in many gardens during this time of

year. These trees provide drama, structure, height, colour and interest. Many

can be purchase as multi stemmed rather than the one stem normally associated with trees.

Acer griseum, the paperbark maple, as described, the peeling mahogany coloured bark and its papery like appearance always attracts interest, but stands out beautifully during the winter.



Betula x utilis var. Jacquemontii 'Doorenbos' and B. x u. jac. 'Grayswood Ghost' as the name suggest provides a pure white stem, especially against the backdrop of an evergreen. Even better with lamps at the base of the tree, spectacularly illuminates at night, totally transforming the garden dramatically.

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'A LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS'

Richard Gilbert Scott's first independent architectural commission was St Mark's Church, Biggin Hill, consecrated in 1959, where the roof and building materials from a disused Victorian church in Peckham were reused in conjunction with a campanile plan form in his grandfather's (Sir George Gilbert Scott) abstracted Gothic style.

The atmosphere inside any church is not only enhanced by the quality of the architecture but by the quality of the lighting and sound system within. It is a joy to occupy a building that is not only a focal point for our Village, but a significant and important building designed by a celebrated architectural practice, George Gilbert Scott Architects. The building was also created by a visionary, Rev. Vivian Symons and was funded through individual and community contributions, sometimes brick-by-brick donations.

We are privileged to be the custodians of this beautiful building to worship here and to serve our community. We are now asking for help from this community again.



Our lighting system has served its purpose for many years but is no longer providing the lighting levels or functionality that are needed for the building as we seek to respond to the changing demands and uses, both for our services and for a wider community use. It is now in need of replacement; it is old lighting technology and it is becoming






increasingly difficult to find replacement fittings and bulbs.

We have been working in consultation with CES Lighting & Electrical Services to design a new system that will cater for our needs now and into the future as we look to make our church building more accessible to the needs of the church and our wider community here in Biggin Hill. The proposal will include a new control system, allowing

individual light switching to provide a high variety of lighting configurations ranging from a general blanket light spread to specific highlighted areas for a wider variety of events.



We have been fundraising for some time and now have more than £20K towards the cost of the works. We are setting up an appeal to the community for further donations. We need to raise another £20K in addition to grant applications currently in hand. Please would you consider making a donation to help us achieve this goal? This will enable us not only to continue our worship and serving the community, but to expand the use of the building for a variety of activities and events too.





Melanie and Sophie your Independent Councillor Team.

Following on from the last edition, we wanted to focus on our role, and how we can work more effectively within the community.

But what does **COMMUNITY** stand for?We believe it's a **Common O**bjectives, **M**utual **M**issions, **U**niting **N**etworks **I**ndividuals **T**ogether!

Our role, or job if you like, is to develop an understanding of the local community, its issues, needs, concerns and by being a main point of contact, lead and campaign effectively to deliver outcomes that make a difference.

We work closely with all organisations, agencies, associations, group and council, but in order to be fully effective we need to work as a whole team, with you as individuals as well!.

What does **TEAM** stand for? We believe it's by working **T**ogether **E**veryone **A**chieves **M**ore!

In order to be fully effective we need your support and would ask that you consider using support tools already in place but greatly underused!

We often get reports of anti-social behaviour, theft, and burglary through social media and gossip groups. But this is not reporting crime! It is not getting the true picture of what is happening in our community and on the transparent score boards. Without proper and active crime reporting the Police are blissfully unaware of the reality of living within Biggin Hill.

Although we do work closely with our Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team and can pass on anecdotal information, we cannot report incidents of crime for you. Nor can we make you feel totally safe and secure within Biggin Hill.

But what about joining a Safer Neighbourhood Watch. A watch is about bringing together the community, in bit size chunks, streets, lanes, hills or closes, for the purpose of crime prevention and making safer places to live, work and play. It's about looking out for each other, sharing of information, reporting and making others aware of suspicious "going ons". It is not curtain twitching, nosey parkers, or interfering neighbours!

It is a do-it-yourself thing, run as you so see fit, doing as little or as much as the group wants, with one person as being the lynch pin! The

police do not run the group but have the ability to support the group and it's a chance for us, the local residents, to hold the local policing team to account for the work they do in and around the ward. It is also an opportunity to set them priorities and get them to focus on issues that are affecting our community.

The population of Biggin Hill is nearly 10,000 residents of which 0.25% are actively working as a watch to look out for themselves and their neighbours!

Come on Biggin Hill Community!

It's easy, non intrusive and you can take from it as much or little as you want. It's about being alert, sharing information and taking time to be neighbourly! You do not take on responsibilities of the police, you are not vigilantes and certainly you are not ever put at risk!

If you are interested in keeping not only yourself and family safe, but wanting to build a safer neighbourhood and share information on keeping safe, then please do contact us and we will assist in getting you started.

Patient Participation Group Norheads Surgery

Newsletter January 2023

Welcome to this special New Year's edition of the Norheads Lane Surgery's PPG newsletter. We present here a brief overview of the PPG and its aims.

What is the PPG?

The purpose of the Patient Participation Group, PPG, is to provide a forum for the involvement of patients with the work of the Norheads Lane surgery. Its membership potentially covers all patients as well as the doctors and surgery staff. In 2016 it became a contractual requirement for all GP surgeries in England to establish a PPG. All the country's PPGs have similar objectives, but they may differ a little in the details of their organisation and services.

The PPG is managed by an executive committee comprising the surgery's two doctors and the Practice manager, and several patients. The PPG Executive committee is headed by a chairman supported by a secretary and treasurer. It meets frequently throughout the year and holds an AGM usually in the June or July. We are keen for as wide a range of patients as possible to join the Executive Committee and support our activities.

What does the PPG do?The PPG Executive Committee members provide:

- information about events at the surgery e.g., flu vaccination clinics delivered by emailed newsletters, surgery entrance notice board, or word of mouth:
- support to the practice nurse by supervising the queues for vaccination clinics;
- raise funds for providing equipment for the surgery e.g., clinical couch
- representation at the Five Elms PCN meetings.

We are always trying to widen our reach out to patients by adding to our email list. We are also keen to broaden the range of patients on the Executive Committee: if you would like to participate, please contact the PPG Chairman, David Dilling at daviddilling49@gmail.com.

FUND RAISING BY THE PPG

One of the activities of the PPG Executive is that of raising funds to support the work of the Norheads lane GP practice. A recent example of successful fund raising was the purchase of a medical examination couch for Dr Bolanle Idowu's consultation room. Our current fund-raising scheme is the 50:50 club. The 50:50 Club. This fund-raising scheme is based on 50:50 club members paying £12 for a numbered ticket covering a year's worth of monthly draws. The draws will be made on the 3rd Wednesday each month at the Norheads Lane surgery premises. Eligible ticket numbers will be added to a random number generator and the drawn ticket will be awarded a monetary prize to the value of 50% of the total monies for that month.50:50 club members must be a patient at Norheads Lane surgery or complete their application for club membership at the surgery premises. Members may buy any number of annual tickets. The Club's recent draw (December) awarded ticket holder the prize of £32.50, with the same amount going to the PPG account. In this way, both the surgery and the club members benefit from each draw. As new members join, so the prize increases. We will be contacting Club members soon to arrange for 23/24 annual subscriptions and we would like to encourage Standing Orders to be set up, where possible, please. Thank you to all our 50:50 Club members, who have made significant contributions to the costs of the clinical beds recently purchased by the surgery. FIVE ELMS PRIMARY CARE NETWORK (PCN)

What is the PCN? Primary Care Networks (PCN) have been established across the country since 2019 as part of the NHS Long Term Plan for Primary and Community Care. Each of these PCNs incorporates several local GP practices. The aim is for the PCN to provide a number of additional services and support for patients and the GP practices. As explained below, the idea is that greater benefits are achieved by providing the PCN's additional resources centrally rather than spreading them thinly across each surgery. The PCN aims to join-up the work of

General Practices, Community Services, Mental Health Services, Social Care, and various Voluntary Organisations – creating "holistic care".

There are five PCNs covering the Borough of Bromley. Our Norheads Lane GP practice falls within the Five Elms PCN, along with GP practices at Stock Hill, Southborough Lane, Bromley Common, and Summercroft. These five GP practices provide care for a total of just over 45,000 patients. The Clinical Director for Five Elms PCN is Dr Taraq Waheed, who is based at Southborough Lane GP practice. 


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THE MOVING CHURCH NEWS

St. Mark's is known as the "Moving Church" as in the 1950's it was constructed from materials brought from the redundant church of All Saints North Peckham. This remarkable feat of dismantling and building carried out by local Biggin Hill people was accomplished through the initiative and vision of the then vicar, The Revd. Vivian Symons. He mobilised the local parishioners to create a truly worthy parish church in place of their ageing corrugated iron building. This fascinating story is recounted in an illustrated colour guide available from the Church.
