## Remembering the Battle of the Somme

The Battle of the Somme began on 1st July 1916 and lasted until 18th November 1916. It was a bloody battle with an enormous number of casualties; one of them was my Great Uncle, John Milne.

John was born in 1897 and was brought up along with his nine brothers and sisters in the village of Fettercairn by his parents John and Margaret. Along with thousands of others, he decided to do his bit for King and country and joined his



local regiment, the Gordon Highlanders and before long he found himself in northern France as part of the 51<sup>st</sup> Highland Division.

On 13th November 1916 he was part of the battle to take the village of Beaumont-Hamel. Although it was a success, he sadly lost his life.

To mark the centenary of his passing, we went to the cemetery where he lies to lay a wreath and pay our respects to an uncle, never met but never forgotten. He is buried in Y-Ravine cemetery that forms part of the "Newfoundland Memorial Park" which is now a peaceful resting place but also a lasting reminder of this awful conflict.

He has many living relatives who visit him regularly and it was an honour for my brother David, our nephew Cameron, my husband Tony and me to pay our respects.

One man died, here in this place One man sent to God's embrace One man left his home to die One man dead, I can't tell you why.

One man died who I know well One man whose story I now retell One man died, he was my blood One man died, lost in the mud.

One man lies here amongst the rows
One man lost when the world came to blows
One man died, we might forget
Only one man, why should we fret?

A million men died in this place A million men sent to God's embrace A million men sent to die One million men, I can't tell you why.

> A million men died in France A million gone, led in a trance A million men sold a lie A million men sent to die.

A million more died over there A million taken from their mother's care A million men we might forget Only one million men, why should we fret?





#### WATCH COMMITTEE

This year the WATCH Committee, with the agreement of the Kirk Session, is supporting both the Blackhall St Columba's project Building for the Future and the Clowndoctors project which is part of the Hearts and Minds charity. (Scottish Charity no. SC027040)

Clowndoctors work with seriously ill children in hospitals and hospices and children with special needs in respite units and special schools. They are not doctors but they are professional performers who undergo specialist training to produce laughter and smiles. They use clowning and humour to provide sensitive, safe and individually tailored interactions for the participants. Working in pairs, they are a form of therapy, not party or circus clowns or entertainment.

The charity receives less than 10% government and local authority funding relying on the support of individuals, companies and other organisations to continue its work. We have committed to fully fund the specialist training of two Clowndoctors at a cost of £4,000 - anything raised above this going to the Building for the Future project.

Proposals for the Building for the Future project were presented to the congregation on August 20th.

The Committee has started the fundraising with the Summer Coin Collection which was well supported by all who attended the services in July and August.

We will be holding the Craft Coffee Morning on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> October which provides an opportunity to view and purchase examples of craft work while enjoying a cup of coffee or tea with a scone or two. Our main event will be the popular Christmas Fair on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> December at 2 pm – a planning meeting for all involved in the organisation of this event will be held on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30 pm. More details about the Coffee Morning and the Christmas Fair will be published in forthcoming editions of the Kirk News and the Blackhall Bulletin.

## The Virtuosity of Gentleness

Dear Friend,

I hope you have had a wonderful summer break and feeling refreshed, rested and good to go!

If you are like me, going off on holidays for a well-earned rest with family (ideally to a warmer climate, such as my beloved Majorca), this is a highpoint in any given year. However, the thought of having to make my way to the airport, struggling my way through the busy Edinburgh



traffic and then having to queue through the cut-throat process of the checking in, with difficult 'me first' individuals, is something which fills me with trepidation and dare I say, anxiety. Oh for a time when the world was (at least in our collective memory) a more considerate place. Do you sometimes find yourself wishing for those times? Do you yearn for a return to civility?

Author Robert Fulghum addressed the problem of a general lack of courtesy and politeness this way: "All I really need to know about how to live and what to do and how to be I learned in nursery. . . Share everything. Play fair. Don't hit people . . . Say you're sorry when you hit somebody." Then he went on to mention that the world would be a better place if everyone, including the leaders of governments, lived by these basic principles.

The truth is that much of the interaction between people today has degenerated into a harsh, inconsiderate exchange. Few seem to understand the value of gentleness. Instead, roughness and sarcasm are the accepted ways to express our opinions and impose our wills. Many people however, are totally unaware that they are rude or that the way they speak and act impacts on others. They may even deny their prejudice because, to them, they mean no harm. The standard response to any negative reaction is to growl, "Life is tough. Get over it!"

But it is the quality of gentleness that bonds the new-born to the mother, which births trust in the heart of the child, and that creates the atmosphere in which loving and caring can do their greatest work. Cardinal Newman once said, "It is almost the definition of a gentleman to say that he is one who never inflicts pain."

Gentleness serves as the shock absorber in human relationships. It may not change the road that must be travelled, but it can make the bone-shattering roughness of life's bumps and potholes much easier to negotiate. Gentleness proactively informs us on how to interact with people, and it simultaneously refuses to inflict pain on others.

Let's face it; even though we've come to expect rudeness and roughness in society, all of us prefer to be treated with a gentle manner. Doctors, dentists, chiropractors and other health care practitioners know this. That's why they advertise that they cause as little physical pain as possible in their work. By the same token, those who make a sincere effort to practise gentleness in the give and take of spiritual life will attract others to them.

Is it time to seriously analyse our treatment of others? Time to learn to choose our words more carefully and monitor our entire approach as we interact with others? This exercise goes beyond the conventional sensitivity training that may be offered in other venues. Rather than any superficial behaviour modification technique, it starts with the deep, spiritual qualities of the heart and builds a new outlook of respect and appreciation of others.

You see, respect is not just something you do; respect is an inner quality that becomes exposed when challenged! Jesus, the Gentle Shepherd, becomes our role model. "Come to Me, all you who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28).

As you reflect on this, let me wish you every blessing to you and yours,

The congregation will be aware that for the last year members of the Building for the Future Committee, have visited various churches throughout Scotland to see what can be done with traditional buildings to make them more "user friendly" and welcoming in the

21st century. We were all agreeably surprised at the results. As a consequence a wish list was drawn up and circulated to firms of Architects who have experience in this field of work. Three firms were invited to speak to us and present their ideas based on the original wish list. Lee Boyd was chosen to be our Architects. They have a great deal of experience in renovating Churches and we investigated their work carefully before making a final decision.

A feasibility study was then started which involved a detailed inspection of Blackhall St Columba's buildings and area including a digital survey. The Architects issued a questionnaire to all groups using the Church buildings. There was a good response. Then more detailed plans were drawn up and inspected by the committee. There has been a lot of ongoing discussion about these plans, which involve both the Sanctuary and the halls. At the time of writing the study has been completed after further discussions with the Architects, along with structural engineers, and services engineers. Quantity surveyors have also been involved so that costings can be done. Decisions have still to be made about cost, feasibility and possible phasing.

This will all have been presented to the congregation (with a 3D computer graphics model) on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> August after the morning service. The deadline for the Bulletin meant that we could not report on the outcome at this time. There will be more news in the December Bulletin.

Fundraising is actively being considered. The first step of this is the sale of Church house, which is now being actively marketed.

Today we had a very big event at Cwengwe location, where we invited the Moderator of the General Assembly to open a sub-station named after the late XB Makina, who was killed in car hijacking in 2000, while he was a Minister at Pirie Mission Congregation. In fact this was formally known as Rankin, I'm not sure of my spelling, but it is said to be one of the sub-stations that were built by Rev John Ross. As you have seen the first picture, it was demolished long time ago by heavy rains and storm and the congregation of those times did not have means to rebuilt it. Their children, together with the assistance of the late Rev Makina and the surrounding community members who claim to have been educated there, took it as their responsibility to rebuild, but soon thereafter Rev Makina died and the project was not finished until Rev Gwala arrived! It's better than before, although my sister and her children are struggling to come to terms with it. He is a policeman and was about to retire in December at 60. John (not real name) moved into his first tenancy in early January this year. He became homeless one year prior to this after a family dispute. This led to him presenting himself homeless at the Council and the allocation of a hostel in a rough suburb of Edinburgh. He found this experience quite 'unsettling' and it led to periods of what he describes as 'ups and downs' in his mental wellbeing (he suffers from schizophrenia).

He also found the initial stages of moving into his new flat quite challenging. As he is living on benefits for ill health he had no money to furnish his property. He was able to access state funds for some furniture but still lacked many of the items one needs to make a home. In February we received a referral for our Hit Squad Service, which led to John working alongside two of our volunteers and decorating two of his rooms. We were also able to help John with the provision of a number of our starter packs, including pots and pans, towels, cleaning items, lamps and a vacuum. In addition, unusually, we had received some beautiful new couches from CALA Homes enabling us to provide him with a three-piece suite.

John was very grateful for the help that he received from Fresh Start commenting that the assistance that he received 'definitely' made the transition of moving into his first home 'go a lot smoother'.

#### WHAT IS A CARER?

A carer is an unpaid person who looks after a relative or friend who cannot live at home without additional support. Many carers do not identify themselves as such. They see themselves as someone's husband/wife, brother/sister, mother/father, daughter/son, friend, or neighbour. If you offer unpaid care or support for someone else due to illness, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction, and they cannot cope without your support, you are a carer.

#### Wi Rascals

Our young carers project (Wi Rascals) supports children up to 16 years of age who take on a caring role, usually for a sibling, a parent, or grandparent. This can be as either a primary or secondary carer.

Wi Rascals allows young carers to take a break from their care responsibilities in the company of peers who share their experiences.



#### Side by Side

The main aim of our dementia carers project is to offer befriending, peer-support and to increase quality of life for carers of people affected by dementia or cognitive impairment. This project also enables carers and the person they care for to meet others, share experiences and benefit from peer support.

#### Alternative to Day Care

We have enjoyed a varied programme of talks since the last Bulletin.

Rob Murray, Scotland Manager of Changing Faces delivered a very interesting and well-illustrated talk entitled "Face Equality in Scotland". Changing Faces supports children, young people, adults and families with face disfigurements and helps to build their self-confidence and achieve their life goals. He explained that the organisation campaigns for face equality in schools and at work while challenging misrepresentation and discrimination.

John Grace followed with "Rain Forests and the Global Carbon Budget" and explained the uptake of carbon dioxide by rain forests and savannas; the impact of vegetation on the atmosphere and climate change; upland microclimates and their impacts upon plants; effects of drought on plants and plant water relations; carbon sequestration by vegetation; long-term effects of environmental change upon forests; elevational limits of trees.

The early March talk was given by author Alan Ness who spoke about his book "A Man's Game" which is a contemporary crime novel exploring issues of violence, addiction, and misogyny, both in "the beautiful game" and in wider Scottish society.

An excellent talk "War and Peace: Military Army Chaplaincy" accompanied by a brilliantly compiled video and evocative music was given by The Rev (Lt Col) Benjamin Abeledo, Minister of Blackhall St Columba's Church about his career and experiences as a Senior Army Chaplain on his tours of Helmand Province, Afghanistan.

We also had two outings; The National Museum of Flight in East Lothian - a journey of discovery at this former airfield exploring the history of aviation from the First World War to the present day with interactive exhibitions and of course, the iconic supersonic Concorde. On 4<sup>th</sup> May a group of our members experienced the slower pace of a cruise on the Union Canal from Ratho with The Seagull Trust.

On our final meeting of the season, which was also attended by wives and partners, we heard about "The Work of The Vine Trust" followed by a splendid Spring Lunch at The Royal Burgess Golfing Society of Edinburgh.

Our final outing of the session was our Summer Outing to the Pitlochry Festival Theatre to see High Society, a musical comedy based on a book by Arthur Kopit with music and lyrics by Cole Porter. 


