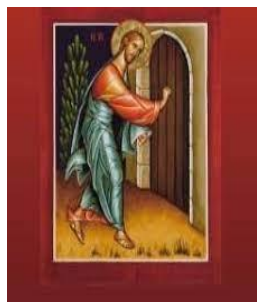

## Reflection by Fr Thomas Skeats

St. Thomas Aquinas taught that God made absolutely everything out of absolutely nothing. In the beginning there was nothing and no natural possibility of anything coming to be at all, there was not even a context in time and space for something to be. Everything that *is* owes its very being, its existence, to God: God is the explanation or cause of the whole of creation.

Nevertheless, this view that God is the primary explanation and source of everything is not incompatible with the idea that we might discover in nature secondary or natural causes that explain why the world is the way it is. Indeed, Aquinas suggests that this is the way that God ordinarily chooses to manifest his almighty power: God, the primary cause of everything, chooses to work through secondary causes. He chooses to work through the natural powers of the creatures that he has made. This means that God chooses to bring about his will in the world through non-living creatures such as the wind and rain and soil, through living creatures such as plants and animals, and even rational creatures such as human beings and angels. Aquinas is asking us to imagine a hierarchy of being in which God is holding all that he has made in existence and using what he has made as his instruments to bring about his will.

The Christian tradition is very clear that God wills good things for his creatures, and he directs his creatures towards goodness. All things come from God, and all things are on a journey back to God. There is a providential order and harmony to the world that has its source and fulfilment in the perfect goodness of God. Now within this providential ordering of creation human beings have been given the particular privilege of being able to participate and co-operate in God's providential governance of the world. We have been given freedom, and we can use that freedom for good or ill. We use our freedom well when, through obedience to the will of God, we enhance the order of goodness and harmony of his creation. We use that freedom badly when we rebel against God and create disorder, conflict and friction. We must not think, however, that we are only God's instruments when we choose good. God's power is so great that though we might ruin our own happiness by rebelling against his ordering of creation and his governance, we can never thwart his plan for the salvation of the world. In the end, even the evil we do and the evil we suffer can be turned to good, and the most powerful sign of God's power to draw goodness from evil is the cross. But that is a topic for next week.

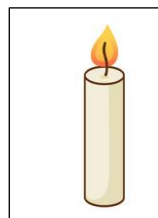
