





The Vicar's Letter:

On Sunday 17th October I was at Christchurch Priory for the Deanery Confirmation Service with Bishop Debbie. I was there with Revd Kay to support Lewis, Charlotte, Rebecca and Annabelle who were there to be confirmed, which is to make public their faith in Jesus Christ. The power and beauty of the Confirmation service lies in knowing something of each candidate's life story. Some life stories are harder to hear and know than others, but that only ever accentuates the beauty of what is taking place; that despite the challenges of life people are still standing up and declaring their intention to publicly live as followers of Jesus.

This is the simple yet transformative vision of our Benefice family to 'Discover life in Jesus Christ and make a difference in our communities'. Against a backdrop of declining church numbers and the constant desire to fill our churches with the 'missing generations', here were four teenagers standing up publicly and stating that they wanted to be followers of Jesus - I have to confess I held back tears of joy at more than one point during the service.

But what comes next? For these four teenagers, they are back in school today, with their friends, in lessons. The comparison between a large and ordered service in the Priory and the frenetic, often disordered nature of everyday life is great. But that's the way our faith is meant to work. We are meant to be with the people of God, often, but not necessarily, on Sundays, worshipping God in Christ, encouraging others in our church families and being set up for the week ahead. Then, we are a sent, a scattered people, out beyond our buildings and gatherings in the complexity and chaos of the world



carrying the light, hope and beauty of Jesus with us.

The confirmation service was one with one with a twist; there was a commissioning that followed the baptisms and confirmations. Helen was presented with her Bishop's Commission for Mission (BCM) in Pastoral Care. I remember thinking

'how wonderful it was in the same service to be reminded that as God's baptised people, we are all called to his service'. The 19th century preacher E.M Bounds said, "men and women have always been God's method". On 9th October Kevin and Jan from our Benefice were in the Cathedral church to receive their BCMs in Pastoral Care. A reminder that God is calling people within our own benefice to discover and be affirmed in their callings.

Christians refer to calling as vocation and every member of the Church has one. Vocation has been overly associated with priesthood in the part but as we note in Jeremiah 29.11 God has a plan for each of our lives. Before you consider if God is calling you to do something as part of your personal calling, you might like to take encouragement from Mother Theresa who said of vocation 'many people mistake our work for our vocation. Our vocation is to love Jesus.' And loving Jesus as our primary vocation is something we can all hold in common. Building on that foundation of loving Jesus, you might be encouraged to discover that God has given you gifts and talents for his service. To cite an old and slightly pithy, but nonetheless, true saying, the God who calls equips. Or as Aristotle expressed it 'where the needs of the world and your talents cross, there lies your vocation'.



Celebrating Christmas - Embracing joy through art and reflection




An Advent Book of Days tells the stories of all the characters

THE NEW NORMAL: COVID 19 Precautions In Church

These measures were agreed by the Vicar and PCC following the release of guidance from the Church of England. We will continue to err on the side of caution and to be mindful of the current increase in case numbers. The Vicar and PCC understand and respect that as of the 19th July, decisions on the wearing of face masks and social distancing are no longer requirements in law but determined by individuals. The provisions which follow are our best attempt based on HM Government and Church of England guidance to promote safe churches where people can pray, worship and take part in activities with confidence. All of these measures will be reviewed in the autumn.

☒ We will maintain social distancing in pews except for large services including weddings, baptism and funerals which will be assessed on an individual basis and steps taken based on the number of attendees expected and the capacity of the church. In this case individuals must then take personal responsibility for their own safety.

☒ We will provide cards for congregation members to place on the pew next to them, if they wish to do so, so that no one else sits there.

☒ We will encourage the use of face masks when moving about the church. These can be removed when seated.

☒ Singing in church is now allowed and we will do so, but ask people to still wear a mask if possible.

☒ Holy Communion will remain in one kind only until at least the autumn.

☒ Test & Trace forms and QR codes are now no longer compulsory. However, we will retain them and would appreciate cooperation to continue providing details from church attendees, but no one will be compelled.

☒ The Peace will remain non-contact as now. ☒ Cleaning will return to pre-pandemic levels.

Major Faith Leaders together demand climate action at COP26 in Glasgow

Faith leaders have been joining together to demand climate action ahead of the COP26 meeting in Glasgow (1st - 12th November).

Graham Usher, Bishop of Norwich, and lead Bishop on the Environment for the Church of England signed the letter alongside leaders of every major Christian denomination and representatives from Baha'i, Buddhist, Hindu, Jain, Jewish, Muslim, and Sikh communities.

The declaration states: "We remind governments of their commitments made in Paris in 2015 to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees, and of Article 17 of the Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights to protect the environment, the biosphere and biodiversity.

"We call upon them to take the urgent action needed to avert the loss, damage, and forced migration threatened by climate change.

"Across our doctrinal and political differences, we know that we must change our ways to ensure a quality of life which all can share, and we need to provide hope for people of all ages, everywhere, including future generations.

"To offer hope in the world we need to have confidence that those in power understand the vital role they have to play at the Glasgow COP26."

The Glasgow Declaration pledges a response to the challenge set by the climate emergency through being "advocates for justice by calling on governments, businesses and others who exercise power and influence to put into effect the Paris agreement; to make the transition to a just and green economy a priority; and to commit to science-based targets that are aligned with a healthy, resilient, zero-emissions future."

What can I do for the Climate?

As I produced this issue of the magazine, I felt it was important to include articles about Climate Change given the importance of COP26. As I was looking for a prayer I came across this webpage which provides some simple, unemotive background to the importance of this conference, as well as ideas for prayer and simple things individuals can do to make a difference:

In my family, we have been trying to improve how much of a 'foot print' we are making - something we have been finding so difficult because of the way everyday products are produced and sold. There is so much 'green washing' - where companies say they are doing their bit but it is, in my opinion, woefully short of the mark. As an example, we are trying to make our bathroom free of single use plastic bottles. We are using soap, shampoo, shaving cream, conditioner and body lotion bars. The cleaners are being replenished with dissolvable sachets and tap water (saving on bottles, packaging, transport costs and space in my cupboards). But, can I easily buy these products in the supermarket? I have found some of the products in local supermarkets BUT they are not easy to find - e.g. the single brand of shampoo bar in one was in a tiny space on the bottom shelf, away from all the myriad of colourful plastic bottled shampoos. Surely if they were serious about the climate these products would be given pride of place?

As individuals we can make a small difference but we need the big differences to come from the most powerful governments - so please do what you can and pray that COP26 really does achieve meaningful results for the planet and humanity.

Lest We Forget



*'In Flanders' fields the poppies blow
between the crosses, row on row,
that mark our place: and in the sky
the larks, still bravely singing, fly
scarce heard amid the guns below.'*

This is the first verse of John McCrae's poem, first published in Punch magazine in 1915. It soon came to symbolise the sacrifice of all who died in World War One. Today, the poppy remains a tangible symbol for those who have sacrificed their lives in war, especially as we remember those who died in Afghanistan. But why do we remember?

'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.' (Micah 4:3). Writing 700 years before Christ, Micah spoke at the time when Samaria fell due to the aggression of Assyria. However, he prophesied a future of hope, a world where nations come together in peace rather than war. His words are fulfilled in the kingdom of God established by Jesus.

Our understanding of **peace** is more than simply the absence of conflict. It is about building relationships between people, communities and nations, founded on love and justice for all. As we remember those who died in war, we should look practically at how we can build such relationships, beginning with our own families, colleagues and neighbours. *'We will walk in the name of the Lord our God for ever and ever.'* (Micah 4:5). Let's ask God's Spirit to make us people of peace, justice and compassion for today's world.

'They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not

weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'

Good to slow down in rain

A cut to the speed limit on motorways in wet weather would be backed by the majority of UK motorists. Such is the finding of a recent poll by the RAC, following a rise in serious accidents.

Almost three-quarters of us would be in favour of following the French method of lowering the speed limit on all major roads when it rains. The Highway Code states that stopping distances in wet weather are at least double those on dry roads, as tyres have less grip.

A spokesman for the RAC said that figures show that 'driving too fast for the conditions' and 'slippery roads' are still among the top 10 reasons for motorway collisions, and they "contribute to significant numbers of serious injuries and even deaths each year."

Is it getting harder to park your car in the garage?

It is not your fault: the bestselling modern cars have become bigger by about up to a third. A comparison of the most popular models sold in 1965 and 2020 had found that most popular modern models have expanded from 59 inches (1.5m) in width to 71 inches (1.8m) in width. Their length has gone from 153.5 inches (3.9m) to 169 inches (4.3m). The most popular 2020 model, the Ford Fiesta, has a width of 66 inches (1.7m).

Yet the average garage door is still only 82 inches wide (2.1m), often leaving just six inches (15cm) each side of the vehicle.

Understanding Investments: Inheritance Tax & the Confidence to Act!

The first step to effective Inheritance Tax (IHT) mitigation is to know how much money you need for your own lifetime. Once you have identified this, you will have more confidence to act and take action.

I have met many people over the years who know they need to do something to reduce the value of their estate as they don't want to pay a high IHT bill, but they fail to act in good time. It wasn't because they weren't aware of IHT (often they had been thinking about what to do for years), but they simply failed to have the confidence to act!

I help clients by following a simple process, at the end of which they understand whether their own retirement and lifetime needs are secure and if so, are able to put in place a plan of how to mitigate future IHT on their estate. I will share this with you.

1-What do you need? We run cash-flow projections (including inflation assumptions), based on your regular expenditure, predicted ad-hoc expenditure and later life planning needs such as care fees.

6-Insuring any remaining liability. Whole of Life cover can pay a future IHT liability and if written in trust, is paid out immediately without the need for probate. It can provide liquidity to the beneficiaries to pay any IHT liability.

For example, pensions are currently outside the estate so perhaps to stop drawing income from them and spend surplus savings instead may be favourable. 



Dogs and people
