



## Prayer

The first and best thing you can do for your local schools is to PRAY! Try to include your school in your regular intercessions, as well as encouraging your congregation to pray for them.

If you are praying for your local schools, let them know! You could even ask them if there's things they'd like you to pray for. Read their newsletter and find out what's happening, to inform your prayers.



Many parishes in our Diocese have a variety of schools. How well do you know your local schools, and how well do they know you? This guide aims to help you consider the ways you can support and work positively to develop a relationship with your nearby schools.

## Visiting schools

Key things to consider when visiting schools:

- Be on time
- Be honest about why you are there and what you are doing
- Look to build relationships with staff, students and parents wherever possible
- Set high standards
- Communicate effectively
- Be polite and positive and follow the rules of the school
- Remember you are a visitor!

## Baking and blessing

Consider how you can bless your schools. Once a term, ask your congregation to do something nice for the staff, such as taking them a box of chocolates or some cake for the staff room. It doesn't need to be complicated or expensive, but a small gesture like a thank you card will be appreciated, and demonstrate that the church cares!



Be realistic about what the church can offer and honest about your limitations.


## Volunteering

## Buildings

Some schools struggle with a lack of space. Does your church have any space they could allow the school to use? Maybe some outdoor space, or an extra room that could be used.

Churches can also be a great asset for collective worship or special celebrations, allowing the whole school to gather to mark Christian festivals such as Easter, Christmas or Harvest. Classes may also benefit from visiting your church as part of an RE or history lesson. ## Partnerships

- Think outside the box, collaborate and look for opportunities to build community.

## Becoming a school governor

All church schools need Foundation Governors. They have a special responsibility to ensure that the guiding principles of the church are incorporated into all aspects of school governance, and ensure the terms of the trust deed governing the school are adhered to. School governors are the strategic leaders of the school, they bring expertise from different areas of life to help the school and its pupils, teachers and wider community to thrive. - Only offer to take part in Collective worship if you are comfortable presenting in front of a large group of children or young people! Make sure you understand how assemblies work in the school, and remember that not everyone is necessarily a Christian, so don't assume knowledge or use language they won't understand.
