Spiritual Capacities	 Experience – Window	 Reflection – Mirror	 Growth – Door
<p>Term’s Christian value: Perseverance</p>	<p>Growing Beans: Children had planted beans and were checking for growth each day. They began to give up when nothing seemed to happen immediately. After the weekend – huge excitement as they saw signs of growth.</p>	<p>Asked by teacher, "How did you feel when you couldn't see the beans growing?" children said, "Sad". One said "We wanted to throw them away."</p> <p>Then asked, "How did you feel when you saw that they were growing?", children said "Really excited! We wanted to tell everyone."</p>	<p>Teacher: children had learned a lot about the preciousness of new life and the importance of patience and perseverance in caring for living things.</p> <p>It was definitely a wow moment when they saw the new plants appearing. They wanted say thank you for the beans to God in class worship that afternoon.</p>
<p>Term’s Christian value: Peace</p>	<p>Class worship: Following questions from children in class about what happens when people die, the teacher used the book <i>The Shore Beyond</i> by Lois Rock in worship, to provide an opportunity for them to talk about the belief held by people of faith, that there is life beyond death.</p>	<p>The children thought about the Bible’s teaching that when people die they go to heaven where God’s love will surround them and where there will be no suffering or pain. The children reflected on what this place might be like. They also talked about people and animals that they knew, who had died. Some of the children said it was hard to do this at home because it made people in their family sad.</p>	<p>Teacher: The children began to understand that whilst it is very sad for the family and friends of a person who dies, it is still OK to talk about them and recall the good memories that they have of them.</p> <p>It is also OK to thank God for them in our prayers.</p>

<p>Exercise imagination and creativity, appreciate beauty in the world and be alive to experiences of awe and wonder.</p>

<p>Be intrigued by mystery and be open to an awareness of the transcendent in the whole of life.</p>

<p>Term's Christian value: Forgiveness</p> <p>Reception & Year 2</p> <p>Be ready to say sorry when mistakes are made, to forgive themselves and to forgive others.</p>	<p>Emotional Literacy: A Y2 child caused a child in Reception to be upset by something that he said to her. This was unintentional on his part.</p> <p>The matter was brought to his attention by the teacher who pointed out that the Reception child was now in tears.</p>	<p>The Y2 child went home that evening and (completely independently) wrote a little story book. The subject of the story was unrelated to the incident in question but he made the Reception child the main character in the story. The next morning he asked the Reception teacher to suggest a time that he could say sorry and read the story to the child.</p>	<p>Headteacher: The Reception child and the Y2 child are now good friends and can often be seen on the buddy bench chatting together at break times.</p>
<p>Term's Christian value: Perseverance</p> <p>Year 2</p> <p>Love themselves, care for themselves, believe in their potential to achieve and find inner strength and resilience when facing challenges.</p>	<p>Forest School: Children had been learning about the way that fire can be used to cook and keep warm in the outdoors. They were using fire starters to create sparks and start a fire.</p>	<p>Certain children were struggling to create sparks with the fire starters. Some of these children were individuals of higher academic ability and were unaccustomed to failure. They were finding it difficult to persevere.</p>	<p>Teacher: Children who often found things difficult in the classroom were succeeding easily in this task. They were able to help the others persevere. This gave them a real sense of value and achievement. It was a special moment.</p>

<p><u>Term's Christian value:</u> Friendship</p> <p><u>Year 3/4</u></p> <p>Demonstrate curiosity and open mindedness when exploring life's big questions.</p>	<p>Royal Wedding celebration: Interest was generated by a royal wedding in why people choose to marry and what makes two individuals decide to commit to one another for life.</p>	<p>A discussion took place about the promises that are made when people marry and the values that would be needed within a relationship to enable both parties to keep the promises. They also reflected about why some people want to be married in a religious ceremony and others prefer another type of ceremony. The children were asked to consider what promises they thought might be appropriate if they were designing a wedding ceremony from scratch</p>	<p>Headteacher: Whilst this discussion was initiated by a wedding, the children reflected more widely about the values which are important in all long lasting relationships.</p>
<p><u>Term's Christian value:</u> Justice</p> <p><u>Year 5</u></p> <p>Be guided by their beliefs and values and be willing to take a stand to defend them.</p>	<p>Literacy – persuasive writing: Children wrote speeches on environmental impact, having watched David Attenborough's 'Blue Planet' documentary.</p>	<p>Reflecting on the experience of writing the speeches, children decided that using plastic straws was unsustainable.</p>	<p>Teacher: After a class discussion about whether to change to paper straws, the children decided to do without straws altogether.</p> <p>They wrote to the Governing Body to explain their decision.</p>

<p><u>Term's Christian value:</u> Courage</p> <p><u>Year 5/6</u></p> <p>Be willing to take risks and to reflect, learn and grow following experiences of failure as well as success.</p>	<p>Inter-school rounders tournament: The children were losing every match by a big margin at the start of the tournament, mainly because they were hesitant and not taking any risks, ie only running to first base and not running at all at some bases.</p>	<p>At the break the captain explained to the team that in order to stand a chance of scoring rounders the players needed to take some risks and not always play safe. If there was a chance of at least scoring half a rounder, they should try their best.</p>	<p>Headteacher: When the players felt confident that they were not letting the team down by getting out, they began to play much better. They beat some teams and in the matches they lost, the deficit was not so large. Most importantly they stopped being so anxious and began to enjoy themselves!</p>
<p><u>Term's Christian value:</u> Truth</p> <p><u>Year 6</u></p> <p>Be self-aware and empathise with the experience of others in the school and wider community.</p>	<p>Forest school: Children asked to use items from forest school to create a waterproof boat that would float. Great care and attention to detail was invested in this project and children were very proud of their boats.</p>	<p>Children tested their boats in front of their peers. Some floated but others sank or fell apart. Children reflected on why some designs were successful and others were not.</p>	<p>Teacher: The activity demonstrated that children were aware that some children felt sad that the boats which they had carefully made, had been destroyed when put in the water. They were respectful and sensitive when discussing why this might have happened. The children concluded that the activity showed that a great deal can be learned from 'mistakes'.</p>

<p>Term’s Christian value: Peace</p> <p>Whole School</p> <p>Be comfortable with stillness and silence and open to engage in reflection/meditation/prayer.</p>	<p>Whole school worship: The children had heard a poem about the time that Jesus visited the home of Martha and Mary (from Roots & Fruits 2 **). (Mary sat down to spend time with Jesus but Martha was too busy.) The children were then invited to spend some time in meditation imagining that Jesus was visiting <i>their</i> home.</p>	<p>Children had some perfumed candles to create a special atmosphere of welcome. They used our normal mindfulness breathing awareness and stilling exercises to prepare for the time of meditation. The children either focussed on the candles or closed their eyes. We asked a few simple questions to guide the children’s thoughts (Who would be in your home when Jesus arrived? How would you welcome him? How would you spend the time together?) We then left two or three minutes of silence.</p>	<p>Headteacher: After the meditation, the children spoke about how thinking about Jesus in their own homes made him much more real to them than when they just heard stories about him. They said the time went very quickly. We discussed the idea that ‘prayer’ for many people includes the practice of spending time with Jesus in their imagination.</p>
<p>Term’s Christian value: Thankfulness</p> <p>Whole School</p> <p>Vertical Grouping (children from Yrs R-6)</p> <p>Appreciate and be thankful for what is good in life and show generosity towards others</p>	<p>Vision Day: As part of a School Vision Day a group of mixed age children were using a Christian Aid resource about the effects on the population of flooding in Bangladesh and the impact that aid workers were having in the disaster struck region.</p>	<p>One of the outcomes of the work was that children began to appreciate how fortunate they were to live in homes that were well made and not susceptible to being completely washed away (along with all their possessions) in heavy rain. They expressed thankfulness for building regulations and high quality building materials.</p>	<p>Headteacher: Along with the desire to raise money for Christian Aid through a cake sale, one Y6 child became very interested in the idea of exploring what is involved in becoming an aid worker. He is in the process of researching this as a career path and is now the pupil lead in our school working towards our Silver Award in the Global Neighbours scheme.*</p>
