WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ST FRANCIS CHURCH?

ST FRANCIS FREE FOOD AND THE COMMUNITY FRIDGE

Over the past couple of months we have been in the process of responding to the fact that not only has the supply of food coming in to us dwindled but we are also receiving fewer requests for food assistance.

This has meant that we have had to rethink how we manage requests for help in the future – but also if the way we have been operating is viable for the future, and indeed, necessary.

This does not mean that we no longer offer support to anyone who is in need of a helping hand.

I would like to make it clear that although we have now wound down St Francis Free Food we will continue to make every effort to make sure that no one in our community is going hungry through lack of food in the cupboard. We have a proposal on the table for an alternative scheme for helping out, we will be making this known when it has been agreed and we are in a position to offer it.

In addition, we have met to discuss whether or not to continue with what was the Community Fridge at some point in the future. On balance, it was recognised that circumstances have changed drastically and that we are now called to respond to the needs of the community in a different way. The accommodation in the former Hive is now drastically reduced too. In view of these changed circumstances, it was agreed that the community fridge will no longer be offered from St Francis. We would like to offer a huge thank you to all those who volunteered to make the scheme a success in the past.

Be assured that the Church of St Francis is totally committed to serving this community, both now and in the future.

THE CURATE'S CORNER

The COVID-19 pandemic, as we all know, has been a difficult time for all of us but this week I have been forced to reflect yet again on the huge emotional and psychological stress it is causing and especially the damage that is being inflicted on relationships we have with our loved ones. A few days ago a person known well to me suddenly developed dramatic symptoms of dementia that threatened their own safety, and since some violence was being manifested, that of others too. We are experiencing a sea change at the moment in the way that healthcare is managed and as a result it was very difficult to get help. I was horrified by how much effort and – frankly – shouting was required to get the assistance this person is entitled to, but fortunately in the end a place was made available in a suitable home. This means that, after a COVID-19 test, the person will be in a safer environment, but sadly it also means that no-one will be allowed to visit, and for who knows how long. In the moments when this person is lucid they will be feeling abandoned and probably unable to understand why the isolation is demanded, factors that will inevitably add to confusion and deep distress.

I know that this is something that is affecting many. I am also seeing the inevitable trauma that is being caused to family and friends who are quite simply cut off completely from those they have known and loved, and been loved by, for many years. This is a result of the effects of a response to a pandemic that has been deemed necessary. I am not convinced, however, that the spiritual consequences of these measures have been adequately considered.

May I urge us to pray for all those who are suffering, perhaps by being separated from their friends and families, and for all those who are so deeply and tragically unable to be where they feel they should be at this time. As difficult as it might be, let's also try and keep a check on those known to us who are alone, as well as holding them firmly in our prayers.

On a different note, this coming Tuesday the Church of England calendar remembers with honour two incredibly strong and brave Norwich women.

Elizabeth Fry was born near Magdalen Street in 1780. She was a minister and preacher in the Society of Friends ('Quakers') and became deeply concerned about the shocking and inhuman state of prisons. She is now famous for having worked hard to improve conditions in prisons and spent much of her time looking after women prisoners in particular. Less well known is the fact that she was the first woman to address parliament, worked tirelessly to help the homeless and was significantly involved in the campaign to abolish the slave trade. She opened a

training school for nurses in 1840 that was a huge influence on Florence Nightingale.



Another famous nurse is remembered on Tuesday, Edith Cavell. Edith was born in Swardeston, the daughter of the vicar. She trained as a nurse, eventually working for the Red Cross in Belgium where she found herself at the outbreak of World War 1. She refused to come home and tended the sick of both sides. She became involved in smuggling British soldiers into Holland and in 1915 she was caught and put on trial. Protecting her colleagues, she was sentenced to death and executed by firing squad. Her body was eventually returned to Norwich and her funeral was at the cathedral, where she is buried. Her grave has been recently restored and it can be found a little way eastwards from the south door.



Elizabeth and Edith died on October 12th, in 1845 and 1915 respectively. They remain a massive inspiration to us all and we remember them with pride. May they rest in peace.

For you have made the city a heap, the fortified city a ruin; the palace of aliens is a city no more, it will never be rebuilt.




On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-matured

MATTHEW 22:1-14

Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other slaves, saying, "Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet." But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his slaves, maltreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, "The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet." Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests.



'But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, and he said to him, "Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?" And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'

REFLECTION FOR 18TH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

Our reading in Isaiah follows chapters recording the demise of many cities and the judgement of God on all nations when he lays waste the earth. It does actually fit well post creationtime when we considered what is going on in our world today and the damage the earth is suffering. The chapter ends with an image of Gods' reign over a renewed earth, his triumph is for himself but also for his people.

Today the reading from Isaiah begins with a song from a lone singer, taken to be Isaiah, which praises all the wonderful things God has done. The gloom has gone and he is transported to the heavens by a song of praise, he is impressed by the sheer power of the Lord's

deeds. God has been and always will be on the side of the poor and needy.

On Mount Zion God will provide a feast for all people which includes the best of food and wine. By implication the feast is free and God will be the host, but the feast is both inclusive and exclusive. It will be for all people but in one place, only on Mount Zion. The onus is on nations to go there, it is not restricted to only to faithful Israelites.

The feast is to be a victory celebration, but this one will be a total victory, it will defeat the ultimate enemy, death itself. The destruction of the shroud or sheet in verse 7 represents the universal sorrow that death has brought into the world. There is no clear time line given, the assertion simply is that this is what God will do. The decisive victory over death is won in the death and resurrection of Jesus which we enter into more fully when Jesus returns. It is then that death is swallowed up for ever, pain and sorrow are removed and tears are wiped away.

Our reading in Matthew also records a feast, for the wedding of the king's son. I think it would be fair to say that in most cultures weddings are a big event. Even in poorer families there is pressure to put on a good show, they can be the best of times but also the worst of times. Everything has to be perfect, the brides dress, outfits of the bridesmaids, the groom and grooms' men, flowers, venue etc., etc.

In the midst of a pandemic things have changed, and for some couples it may be a relief. Think of the money they will save that can be put to better use, it also gives them an opportunity to be more creative in the way they conduct the event. Those of you who read the EDP may have seen the couple who arranged a drive-in for their wedding enabling many more people to be there, the happy couple had a buggy and were able to drive around and see everyone quite safely. I thought it was quite enterprising. Doubtless there will be those whose plans have fallen by the wayside who are bitterly disappointed and businesses that may suffer due to lack of income.

There were many couples during the war who had to make do, some brides using parachute silk to make their dress, it isn't new and by and large most weddings will still be enjoyed, for the right reasons.

In biblical times an invitation to a wedding was something to be taken seriously. In this parable the wedding feast was arranged by the king for his son, it would not have been a brief affair and those invited should have felt very honoured. This should have been a joyous occasion throughout the kingdom, along the lines of the royal weddings we have seen in this

country, no expense spared. It was customary for the initial invitations to be sent out well in advance and then followed up with a reminder when the feast was ready. Any one unable to be there should have spoken up much earlier.

This parable is the last of three Jesus spoke to the chief priests and Pharisees who opposed him in the temple. It's a form of teaching used by him which compares the known with the unknown, or the familiar with the unfamiliar. Parables are designed to convey lessons, not to portray real life. A few days after preaching this parable Jesus will be crucified.

It seems astonishing that so many people declined the final invitation to the feast when so much trouble had been taken to prepare everything, killing the king's servants was the last straw for the king. Going to war may seem extreme but other more recent wars have erupted over less. The events present a somewhat bizarre image, a wedding feast going on with a city burning in the near distance. To scorn the offer to attend such a joyous feast was an act of rebellion against the king himself.

The King in this parable is symbolic of Jesus' heavenly father and the bridegroom is Jesus himself. The original guests invited to the wedding are the Jews, God's chosen people with whom God made a covenant. The king's servants who are attacked were God's prophets,

and the new guests are the Gentiles and others less worthy. For the last two thousand years or so the blessings of God's kingdom have not been reserved exclusively for the Jews but are extended to all who will believe in his son. God keeps all his promises, his gifts and calling are irrevocable.

Eventually there are sufficient guests to make the feast a worthy occasion. It was customary for people to be well dressed at weddings, clothing would probably be embellished and decorated even the poor would have made sure they had the best they could afford, probably white. The king however was angry to find one of the guests unsuitably clothed and he was thrown out into the dark which seems rather harsh, especially as there had been little time to prepare and the individual may have been in very reduced circumstance.

The reading in Matthew links well with Isaiah, both depict a feast to which specific people are invited who fail to respond positively to the invitation, enabling others to take up the offer. For those who have responded to the call of God and trust in Christ through faith there is the prospect of being at the marriage feast of Christ. Many are called, but few are chosen, may we be among the chosen few. Amen


My dear brothers, I love you and want to see you. You bring me joy and make me proud of you. Continue following the Lord as I have told you.




