Dear Friends,

What would you like for Christmas? This is a question that I often get asked by my family and my friends and my answer is almost always the same! I much prefer to ask the question. The giving of gifts symbolises appreciation and love, and there is great enjoyment in thinking about and buying such gifts. There is no lack of choice for ever since the nights started to lengthen the shops started to brighten with the coming of Christmas. Chocolate, toiletries, plants, books, games, toys, clothes, experiences, whatever you can think of you can probably find! I hope that you get something you like for Christmas.

What would the world like for Christmas? We live in challenging times, violence scars so many lives, people suffer from lack of food and water, women struggle to reach their true potential, children are left orphaned, the climate crisis looms large over everything. What would the world like for Christmas, and can we play a part in giving it what it would like?

This year our Advent worship will be based around the four candles that we will light. The lighting of candles symbolises light piercing the darkness, the Advent candles symbolise that light getting stronger and stronger. It is the symbolism of these candles that will shape our worship. On Advent Sunday the candle symbolises hope, on the Second Sunday of Advent it symbolises love, on the Third Sunday of Advent it symbolises joy and on the Fourth Sunday of Advent it symbolises peace. These themes help us to prepare for, and to understand, Christmas.

Each Sunday in Advent we will explore what each one of these looks like, how they have been expressed in Scripture and how we can make them a reality in the world in which we live. What we prepare for in Advent, and then celebrate at Christmas is God's gift to the world, God's plan for the world for when we celebrate Christmas Day, we celebrate the birth of a child in whom the fullness of God resides. In him hope, love, joy and peace are conveyed through his every word and every action. By shaping of our lives in the shape of his we can give hope, love, joy and peace to the world.

None of this easy, it requires prayer, reflection, commitment and courage but, I hope, you will find joy in this Advent iourney, love in the celebration of Christmas, and peace for the year ahead. If you do, remember it is then your task to share that!

When the order came, Mary and Joseph were Living in Nazareth.

















In the last Messenger we published an article by Canon Paul Hardingham who writes for Parish Pump (a resource the Church subscribes to). He is currently writing about the Gospels - this month it is Mark's Gospel

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Mark

Mark is the second of the synoptic gospels, along with Matthew and Luke. Traditionally this gospel is ascribed to John Mark, a close associate of Peter. It was written for Gentile readers, probably in Rome during Nero's persecution of the church (c AD 64-7).

Mark unveils Jesus' public ministry with the words: 'the beginning of the gospel about Jesus Christ, the Son of God' (1:1). The gospel provides a succinct and vivid account of Jesus' ministry, concentrating on what Jesus did rather than what He said. Mark moves quickly from one episode to another, often using the word 'immediately' which is characteristic of his gospel.

For Mark, understanding the true identity of Jesus is fundamental to his gospel. Jesus asks the disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' (8:27), to which Peter replies, 'You are the Christ'. This is evident in Jesus' role as teacher, the call for discipleship and the account of Jesus' death and resurrection, which occupies the last third of the gospel.

A key verse which helps us to understand the nature of Jesus' mission and how we might live in the light of it is: 'Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (10:44,45). As the Suffering Servant, Jesus gave His life on the cross, that we might know and share his love.

Mark is understandably in a hurry to tell us about Jesus: the one who reveals the truth of God to us, that we might live in reality not ignorance!

GETTING TO KNOW GEOFF SWIFT

This month we are delighted to feature one of our longest serving members who has fulfilled many roles within the Bridge Church, including being a serving elder for over 50 years. He is still very active and is the current chairman of the Supper Club

Can you briefly outline your early faith journey?

I grew up in Otley with mum and dad & two brothers and a sister.

My parents did not go to church but sent us to Sunday School in the town. Junior school had some influence as it was a Church of England school with a religious Assembly.



The real influence on my faith

was being at my mother's bedside when she died. At the end she spoke about Leon Cook the Minister of the then Otley Congregational Church and she also sang a hymn. It was tradition at that time go to church the following Sunday after the funeral, which I did and have been doing ever since, being joined by my future wife, Anne shortly after.

What is your favourite memory of the Bridge Church?

This would be my ordination as deacon in 1966, with the hymn 'Just as I am thine own to be'.

What is you favourite hymn and why?

This would have to be 'Abide with Me'. I was in the crowd at a football match at Elland Road, when King George 6th died in 1952 when this hymn was sung.

How would I like to see the Bridge Church develop?

The only way the church would develop would be for more young people to be involved. This would no be easy, there are plenty of young people coming on our premises, with

uniformed groups, parents and toddlers & messy church so there is potential there. Tapping into it is difficult with an ever increasingly secular society.

Can you tell us something about working career?

I started work at 15 leaving Prince Henry's with a School certificate, equivalent to O levels. I obtained a job at an Ilkley engineering company as an apprentice engineering draughtsman for a five year period with a day a week & two nights at Leeds College of Technology. After passing the necessary exams I had a two year break doing National Service obtaining the rank of sergeant. I then returned to the same company eventually becoming a project designer.

I then moved onto sales, selling the equipment I had spent 25 years drawing, building & designing. As the company never exported less than 50% of its products this involved a lot of travel oversees to most countries in Europe, Scandinavia, USA and in later years we became involved in south east Asia which involved travelling to China, Taiwan, Malaysia. Singapore, Indonesia, Thailand & India.

What are your hobbies?

I go to an Art School once a week and play bowls, outdoor in summer, indoor in winter. I am also a member of the Singing for Fun group.

What is your favourite place in the United Kingdom?

This would have to be the Lake District.

What is your favourite place abroad that you have visited?

This would be Singapore.

Which three people would I invite to a dinner?

As dinner is food it is also about conversation so I would invite Richard Burton and Joanna Lumley; the two richest male & female voices I know. I would also invite Nelson Mandela just to be in his presence would be a privilege.

Women's Meeting

John Preston came to speak to us on Monday 7th October about the conservation volunteers at the Hollybush Centre. This charity caters for adults with learning difficulties who normally attend two days per week and is also the charity that the church is supporting.

The adults attending carry out a range of activities such as growing food, looking after flower beds, cooking, crafts and woodworking within a community setting which includes a café! They also attend events such as a garden bird watch; John himself was involved with the RCPB and the British Trust for Ornithology, which was founded in 1933 and has 60,000 volunteers. The BTO track birds, usually early morning, they ring birds traditionally and some are satellite tracked. It is amazing to follow the migration of some birds over the thousand of miles they can travel. We can all follow the lives of birds in our gardens, parks and open areas!

After a slight delay because of Covid, Susan Preston and her husband Chris went on a Peruvian journey. Susan spoke to us about this on Monday $21^{\rm st}$ October.

The journey began at sea level, in Lima, which has an enormous population of 11 million, where they get no rain and very little sun! They climbed higher and higher as they travelled to Colcar Canyon where they saw Condors, then by train to Puno (Lake Titicaca), the floating island with around 200 people living there. The men and boys knit and the women and girls weave - they start at around 5 years old.

They then took a ten hour journey by rail to Sacred Valley where they joined a family, eating and drinking with them. Eventually, the highlight of the trip was a trip by bus to Machu Pichu where they saw Chinchillas and Llamas, which act as lawnmowers, keeping the walls and ruins clear! A very interesting afternoon which concluded with tea and cake from Joan Wiseman's 100th birthday!

On Monday 4th November we had a very interesting afternoon as Christine Shepherd took us on her solo coast to coast walk from St Bees to Robin Hoods Bay. During her

preparation for the walk she slipped and broke her thumb/ arm and during the walk as was known as the lady with the 'pink pot'! At the very start of the walk she dropped her phone into the sea - so no working phone! It took 16 days with stops at B&Bs and hotels along the way. The length of each part varied from 12.5 miles to 23 miles, weather was often misty on high ground. The section from Orton to Kirby Stephen was the shortest section of the whole walk but also the hottest day, unfortunately she ran out of water! A little miracle happened when she visited a beautiful church in Orton on Ascension Day, her phone started up again!! Most of the walk was lovely, with birds song, waterfalls, woods and rivers, but on Day 11 she had to cross the busy A19, where she had to make a run for it! Eventually on Day 16 they enjoyed a lovely walk and finished at Robin Hood's Bay.

We had Andrew Howard once again on Monday 18th November, this time the subject was 'Leisure and Recreation in Old Otley'. As usual it was fascinating to see slides with photographs dating back to the 1850's to the 1920's. It was interesting to see Bridge Avenue in the days before Wharfemeadows Park and that the land downstream was allotments! Tittybottle Park was there first and there were photographs of concerts with around 300 in attendance and music was provided with a gramophone.

Another significant observation was that men wore hats for all sporting events. The members of the swimming club caused a chuckle, as both male and female were very similar in their all in one costumes—some were quite revealing!

Of course there were many pubs, some of which disappeared many moons ago. There were many churches, some now demolished or turned into flats. A very interesting series of photos were taken up Church Lane where there was a theatre, Japanese gardens and leisure facilities which are now home to a car park. The Mechanics Institute was a wonderfully imposing building when built—unfortunately it is now a very sad sight. All in all I thought it was a very intriguing afternoon . The talk was followed by Tea and Biscuits and home made cakes as it was my birthday!
