## Welcome to the June Edition of LINK

### Churchwarden Duncan Argyle offers these thoughts ...



I like parsnips. Fiddling with their tiny seeds recently whilst trying to plant them brought to mind the passage from Ecclesiastes 3:1,2,5 *“There is a time for everything and a season for every activity under heaven: ... a time to plant and a time to uproot ... a time to embrace and a time to refrain”*. Our nation has been through a strange, long time refraining from embracing which is, thankfully, coming to an end, and here I was planting, looking

forward with hope to the time of uprooting!

So what ‘time’ is it for our church? Most importantly during these times of change it’s a time for prayer, committing our future into God’s hands. Isaiah 30:21 says *“Your ears will hear a voice behind you saying, ‘This is the way; walk in it.’”* During our recent APCM new representatives / trustees were elected onto the PCC. All PCC members need to be willingly open to the ear-whispering of the ‘still, small voice’. Our new vicar has yet to be identified; their ears also need to be clear and wide open to hear God’s whispers to come and join us here! ## PCC Jottings - from May's meeting

After an introduction on the role, responsibilities and practical working of the PCC, Gill read from Romans 12: 1- 8 reminding us to offer ourselves and to use the gifts God has given us in doing His work in building His church. As a PCC we are to prepare the way for a new vicar, to have a parish that is ready, healthy and strong, to welcome and work with him or her. Our work as a team begins now and we need to be united in our vision, in our fellowship, in our thinking and planning that all we do may be to the benefit of others and bring honour and glory to God.

Four new members of the PCC briefly introduced themselves.

On the financial front, in another difficult year, the figures show we currently have a deficit of £2k. Our treasurer Andrew encouraged us that we should pay as much as we can to the Diocese, in gratitude that we are being granted a new vicar. At the moment it looks as though we will be well short of the expected contribution. We do have small amounts of legacy money that is restricted in use. The income from the rental of church cottage is in a separate fund.

The main concern on the fabric front is the leaking guttering on the south side of All Saints', with water ingress into the church. The PCC accepted a quote of £3750 to get it re-sealed, a lot of the cost being the scaffolding.

Timothy Rice is working on producing an updated website.

The job description and personal specification for the proposed employment of a family/youth worker has been completed. Much prayer and thought is now needed concerning how this might be funded for a three year initial contract.


A brief introduction was given to the concept of Eco-church – how we can become 'greener' both as a church and individually, a necessity in the escalating problem of climate change. Watch this space!

The PCC meet again on 16<sup>th</sup> June for a meeting with the Bishop or Archdeacon to proceed with advertising for a new vicar.

## A Plain Person's Guide to the Apostles Creed - 10



**I believe in ... the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.**

We are probably all familiar with the words from the funeral service ... *“In sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life through our Lord Jesus Christ.”* When we use the word hope in modern parlance there is usually an element of doubt in our minds, i.e. it might happen. However this is not how hope is used in the Bible. The writer to the Hebrews puts it *“Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see.”*

Jesus said *“I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die.”* Here he links the power of his resurrection to the life of those who personally believe and trust in him. The Apostle John, who used the phrase *“eternal life”* thirty six times in his gospel, explains that entering into a new relationship with Jesus is like being born into a new life. It is because of this new relationship of belief and trust in God **in this life**, that we can have confidence that when we die, the power that brought Jesus from the grave will bring us to be in his presence, **which is life eternal**.

Avoid assumptions – someone said when you assume, it makes an ass of u and me!

## Anne's 'Thoughts from the Tiptoe Triangle'



This month we have the longest day of the year, with daylight extending late into the evening, and the sun rising before most of us start the day.

Many years ago, the changing length of the day was more significant in how people spent their time, as with only candles or gas lighting, less could be achieved in the evenings or early mornings, before electricity enabled us to extend our indoor activities to whatever hours we choose.

Farming follows the changing seasons more closely than most, as harvesting continues late into summer evenings, and there is a more restful period in arable farming over the winter period.

How do we change our patterns of living with the seasons in our daily lives? It may be worth considering how we can live more in line with creation in ways which respect the gifts God has given us: of daylight, of darkness, of warmth and rain. Small changes in our lives can enable us to feel healthier and better care for the environment with which we have been blessed.

Any changes we can make will depend on our individual lifestyles and we all have opportunities to be creative and explore how best we can respond.

Six-year old Angie and her four-year old brother Joel were sitting together in church. Joel giggled, sang and talked out loud. Finally his big sister had had enough. "You're not supposed to talk out loud in church." "Why? Who's going to stop me?" Joel asked. Angie pointed to the back of the church and said,

## Meet the PCC—Arthur Binns



- I was born during WW2 and besides being known as a “War Baby”, I was also a “Services Brat” being born into an Army family. This meant I followed my Dad around the Empire - attending six Infant/Junior Schools and four Grammar Schools!! It also meant “The Family” had a long discussion as to whether I would seek a career in one of the Services – my preference being for the Royal Navy.
- God intervened at that point when I became a Christian in January 1961 at a Week End Away between our Youth Fellowship and one from St Mark’s Gillingham. My conversion verse was (and is) John 14 verse 6 – *Jesus answered “I am the Way and the Truth and the Life. No one comes to the Father except through me “.*
- Leaving the RGS Guildford, I joined the Financial Management Training Scheme at St Thomas’ Hospital, London in August 1961. Following qualifying as an Accountant, I spent a career in the NHS, retiring in July 2000. I then took a part-time job in GP Practice Management in Leicester for 5 years before retiring (properly!) to New Milton in 2005.
- I married Viv in May 1970 when she was the Sister in an OPD at the London Hospital. I asked for her hand via her parents at Christmas 1969 in the time-honoured way. Her mother then insisted on ringing her brother with the news and in the subsequent conversation with Viv he asked why she wanted to marry an Anglican, since, at that stage, he was one of the mainstays of the Lansdowne Baptist Church in Bournemouth! You can see who won that friendly banter within the Family! We have brought up six children, four of them adopted, and there are seven Grandchildren and two Great-grandchildren to date.
- On becoming a Christian, I was encouraged to join the Team running the Sunday School at my Church – St John’s Woking.

From then to 2003 I was involved in various youth work environments ending up with a time as the Chairman of the National Board of Trustees for British Youth for Christ (BYFC)

- Whilst living in the Surrey Docks area of London during the 1960s I served on the local church's PCC. From then until recently, I have always been on various Church bodies from the local PCC to the General Synod (and also as Church Warden or Treasurer at the various Churches we have attended). I served as this PCC's Treasurer from 2006 till 2015. My final involvement was on the Chapter for Leicester Cathedral at the invitation of the Bishop and Dean until last Christmas when the current Bishop indicated that "Enough is enough"
- So now I wait to see what God has in store for me on the new PCC!!

## St Andrew's Font Restored

*The font from St Andrew's has been away at the stonemasons for repair and restoration. During May it was returned to its rightful place.*

Fonts are often placed at or near the entrance to a church's nave to remind believers of their baptism as they enter the Church, since the rite of baptism served as their initiation into the Church. PH

*Our font was moved from its original position straight ahead of the entrance, perhaps when the new carpet was laid. This made it much easier for undertakers bringing a coffin for a funeral.*

When the font was moved to the back of the church, it was discovered that there was a lead pipe leading from the base of the bowl to some form of drainage underneath it. BP

If you are able, either in person or electronically, do have a look at the modern fonts in Portsmouth and Salisbury cathedrals. CP

A modern, portable font was bought, for the church, probably in David Price's time, so that baptisms could be conducted at the front of the church, giving greater visibility for congregation and choir. BP

## What is a font?

A font is a receptacle for holding water for baptism. The word originates from Latin 'fons' meaning fountain or source. Baptism was administered by Jewish people before the time of Jesus. Jesus' own baptism, and others, were held outside where there was a body of water (preferably clean and flowing) and the person was immersed in the water. This was not always practical and there is written evidence that pouring or sprinkling dates to at least the middle of the second century.

Pictures of fonts and baptism can be seen in the catacombs in Rome. Fonts have been made of marble, stone, wood or metal and are sometimes lined with lead. They can be large enough for total immersion of the candidate, small and portable, or anything in between. They are often carved with decoration and depictions of bible stories. They vary in shape, often round or eight-sided and they may have a cover.

## Baptism

*Baptism is the sacrament (the sign of something sacred) which unites Christians to Christ and makes them part of the worldwide church. Jesus' own baptism is described in the Bible.*

*For Christians it marks the cleansing from sin into a new holy life which Jesus offers. Through baptism we remember the death and burial of Jesus for us and his resurrection to new life which we share. When we are united with Christ we receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. As members of the church we share our faith and lives with one another; we need others to learn and grow as followers of Jesus.*

**My favourite place** is Rozel Bay on the Channel Island of Jersey. These Islands have always been special to me - I have been visiting them since I was eighteen months old! ## Bellringing - what is it and why do we ring the bells?



There are various ways to make bells sound. In some countries the bells are fixed and a “hammer” hits the bell on the inside or on the outside of the rim, whereas in other countries the bells are turned round by an electric motor, ringing in a random way.

The traditional way in this country (and a few others) is called full-circle ringing. This involves starting with the bell upside-down and controlling it with a rope around a wheel, allowing the ringer to vary the speed of the bell and allow for change ringing.

Ringing a bell is a skill and not hard work or ‘flying through the air’ (as Christmas cards depict it!)

**Why do we ring bells?** Before the time of clocks and double glazing, the sound would let the local people know a service was about to start. This is not so true now. A lot of our congregation live way beyond the sound from the tower.

So why do we bother? We still announce to the world that services take place. This is a good advert for the church, and helpful for those unable to attend their/this church (due to health, distance etc). As well as services of worship, other times are for gladness like weddings and christenings but sometimes for the sadness of funerals.

Sticking to the Covid rules, we did manage to ring the tenor bell half muffled 99 times following the passing of Prince Philip and again on the day of his funeral service.

### Why else do we ring?

Fun - we enjoy the company - and the actual ringing is good exercise for both body and mind.







