Grants towards the preservation, repair, maintenance, improvement, upkeep, beautification and reconstruction of churches in Northamptonshire. Priority is given to projects for repairs to the structure of the church, including stonework repairs, re-roofing, attention to timber and plasterwork, glazing repairs and drainage.

Diocese of Peterborough

Church Major Works Fund

Exists to help parishes undertaking major church building projects, by providing loans to assist with cash-flow over the project lifetime. The church building must be adequately insured, to at least 75% of the latest valuation.

The maximum loan normally available is 20% of the cost of works, up to a maximum of £50,000, however these terms can be varied according to individual circumstances. No interest is charged on loans to be repaid over five years or less.

Landfill Communities Fund

The Landfill Communities Fund (LCF), formerly the Landfill Tax Community Scheme (LTCS), was created in 1997. It followed the introduction of Landfill Tax under which companies have to pay a fee for every tonne of waste that goes into a landfill site.

This was brought in to cut down the amount of waste that is land filled and to promote a shift to more environmentally sustainable methods of waste management. Landfill operators receive a credit for a proportion of the tax that they send to the Government. This can then be donated to organisations that have been set up to distribute funding.

Customs and Excise established the regulatory body of ENTRUST to oversee the administration of the landfill tax. More information about the scheme is available at <https://www.entrust.org.uk/landfill-community-fund>.

NOTE: You will need to make a payment to the relevant Fund to release their grant if you are successful. This is called a Contributing Third Party payment (CTP).

Landfill operators receive a tax credit of about 90% of the money they give towards the LCF. This leaves them with a 10% shortfall. Each LCF grant beneficiary is therefore asked to arrange a payment to the landfill operator who has provided the money for their grant. This payment is retained by the landfill operator to cover the 10% tax credit shortfall and enables the grant to be released. Please check with the relevant funder for details.

Augean Community Fund

Projects to restore or repair buildings for religious worship, within 10 miles of an Augean landfill site. Projects that maintain or improve public amenities, including church buildings, within 10 miles of an Augean landfill site. Priority is given to projects within 5 miles of a landfill site. Grant potential £5,000 to £50,000.

Biffa Awards – ‘Community Buildings’ and ‘Rebuilding Diversity’

Improvements to a community building, including church buildings, where there is a wider community benefit. For schemes to establish, protect and enhance habitats for biodiversity, access and inclusion are essential. Project must be within 5 miles of a Biffa Operation or 10 miles of a licenced landfill site. Project must cost less than £200,000. Note: no standalone fabric repairs. Grant potential £10,000 to £75,000.

FCC Communities Action Fund

Previously known as WREN, this scheme can help with the maintenance or improvement of a public amenity, including church buildings, within 10 miles of a licensed and active FCC Environment landfill site. For churches, this must be a community space and open and accessible as such. Grant potential £2,000 to £100,000.

Mick George Community Facilities Fund

Improvements to a community building, including church buildings. Projects must be located within the vicinity of Mick George Ltd's operations in Northamptonshire, Cambridgeshire, Lincolnshire and Rutland. Refer to the map on GrantScape's website for precise details of the eligible funding area. Total project cost should be less than £100,000. Faculty, planning permission and other funds need to have been obtained. Grant potential £5,000 to £50,000

Suez Communities Trust

Maintenance, repair or restoration of Grade I listed buildings, structures or sites, including churches. Also, the conservation, restoration and enhancement of natural habitats. Eligible funding areas very limited and currently focused on east of Kettering and Wellingborough, and south of Northampton. Grant potential up to £50,000.

Viridor Credits Environmental Company

Building projects focussing on Heritage or Community, located within 10 miles of a Viridor Landfill site. For community projects, the church building must be open at least 104 days per year. Eligible areas are very limited and currently focused on the south part of Brackley deanery. Grant potential up to £50,000, or £50,000 to £100,000 for the Large Grants Scheme.

Local Authorities

West Northamptonshire Community Fund

Projects to include community buildings, including churches, as well as training, publicity and marketing. Projects must have a demonstrable benefit to the local community, not just the congregation. Funding for purely religious purposes is not eligible. Grant potential up to £5,000 or £15,000 depending on the funding round.

North Northamptonshire Community Fund

Projects to include community buildings, including churches, as well as training, publicity and marketing. Projects must have a demonstrable benefit to the local community, not just the congregation. Funding for purely religious purposes is not eligible. Grant potential up to £5,000, but may be more.

Growing The Rural Church

Growing the Rural Church works to help resource rural Mission Communities, to creatively use their talents and buildings, and to connect with their unique communities and landscapes to develop sustainable futures.

Seven Key Grant Application Tips

- 1) **Plan your project!** Make a list of eligible grant sources, note application deadlines, and record any feedback if you are unsuccessful. Are you able to reapply?
- 2) **Speak to the local community** about your project to gather wider support. How might the changes you want to see benefit them?
- 3) **Research the grant funder.** What are their priorities? Tailor your applications to meet their objectives.
- 4) **Engage** with the funder where possible before writing your application. Do they promote discussion before you apply?
- 5) **Demonstrate the need** for your project and provide evidence for your case. Repairs or conservation work should be clearly identified as urgent in your Quinquennial or other professional report as this can help decision-makers. For reordering projects, evidence gathered through community consultation will help with some funders.
- 6) **Share your draft** grant application paperwork with someone before submitting it.
- 7) **Supply all of the additional documents** requested. Follow their format for submission, adhering to any guidelines they set out.
