





Purpose of management plan

To ensure sustainable land use that:

- meets the functional needs of the church including worship, encouraging spiritual reflection and prayer in the natural environment allowing the benefits of creation to be enjoyed
- maximises the value of our land for biodiversity allowing a diversity of plants, animals, insects and birds to thrive alongside human activity
- provides an outdoor space that benefits the whole community, providing an attractive and appropriate setting for the church, graves and footpaths.

The plan will also be used to record features of interest, allowing their retention and ongoing improvement.





Maintenance

All other grass to be mown regularly

Mowing regime for areas of reduced mowing

Purpose

• To allow any bulbs and meadow plants in the seedbank to grow, flower and set-seed and multiply


Management

- Tidy area with a high cut in March if necessary then leave uncut through to end July/early August. Then cut and remove the grass cuttings.
- Mow again in October prior to winter.
- Leave a strip of vegetation along side northern wall uncut from April through to October. This strip will act as a refuge and food source for a range of invertebrates, small mammals, reptiles and amphibians
- Mow a neat edge to paths alongside areas of reduced mowing to maintain neatness and signal intentionality rather than neglect.
- Areas either side of church entrance to be mown when spring flowers have set seed (cowslips, primroses, violets). Snowdrops and grape hyacinths also noted which are less sensitive.
- Grass cuttings to be taken off site for composting when identified compost heap is full.

Other actions

- If possible, leave any access holes through walls / fences, as well as any 'untidy corners'. It will allow access to and from the churchyard, as well as refuge/hibernation opportunities for hedgehogs.
- Pile any dead wood/branches into an undisturbed corner. An often overlooked habitat that supports a huge array on invertebrates.
- Put up and maintain (annual cleaning in the autumn), bird and bat boxes to provide a safe nesting /roosting
- Put up bird feeding station
- Maintain the compost heap by turning and removal of compost

St Mary's, North Leigh Things to avoid

- Don't spray herbicides and pesticides. It may kill native wild flora and/or pollinators and invertebrates that are food e.g. for hedgehogs.
- Don't clean tombstones to remove lichen this is a valuable habitat for insects.
- Don't remove plants mosses and lichens from walls. Some of these plants can be quite rare but all provide habitat for insects.
- Don't cut trees and hedges during the bird breeding season (March August). Hedgerows support numerous species of invertebrate, small mammal and bird amongst other groups. They provide shelter, food and a safe place to nest. If possible cut only every two - three years.

St John's Churchyard Butterflies

As a local resident and a long-standing member of Butterfly Conservation I have been conducting surveys on the Butterflies to be found in St John's Churchyard for almost 20 years. Following regular consultations with the churchyard maintenance team we have been able to establish areas in the churchyard where the wild flowers and grasses have been allowed to grow and flourish while the grass in other areas has been cut neatly.

As a result, there has been a good supply of nectar plants on which butterflies can feed and their food plants have been able to develop so that they can lay their eggs. I have been very pleased to see how this arrangement has resulted in an increase in the number of species which are breeding in the churchyard. In the current year I have recorded a total of 19 different species of butterfly and a large number of caterpillars of the Cinnabar Moth which feed on the ragwort.


At the end of each season the Upper Thames Branch of Butterfly Conservation publishes the results of all the churchyard surveys in their region. This covers a total of 67 churchyards. I have been delighted to find that in most years St John's Churchyard has been among the top three churchyards for butterflies within the region and is often at the top of the list. The exceptions to this have been those years where the grass has been cut in mid-summer before the grass loving insects have had the opportunity to hatch and breed. This emphasises the benefit of allowing the grass meadow to remain uncut until the end of August.

As I am a keen photographer, I have been taking pictures of the butterflies I have recorded and I have used a few of these pictures to illustrate this article. I have also produced a number of posters which are on display on the church notice board to enable people to recognise and appreciate the beauty of our butterflies.

We have a beautiful churchyard and I would like to thank everyone who has helped to encourage our butterflies to feed, breed and flourish.



Churchyard Guidelines for Safe Gardening

The Churchyard is a delightful place to work and is a vital green and quiet space for central Crowthorne. It is also a haven for wildlife, heritage, and people. Over the years Churchyard volunteers have reflected on experiences, some of which and need to be shared with anyone joining the team.

Before Gardening, Plan Your Safety

Weather, if it is looking sunny wear a floppy hat and sunglasses and apply sun block, especially if working around midday.

If the weather is hot carry a bottle of water.

Footwear should be of robust design with strong toe caps, and cleats. Slippery grass can lead to accidents.

If planning to use machinery e.g. mowers, strimmers please wear ear protectors to reduce risk of tinnitus, safety glasses, and ideally steel toe cap shoes.

Please read the notice "Use of eye, ear, hand and foot protection is recommended when using power tools"

Periodically check that the First Aid box is fully stocked

Ensure you know where the Fire Extinguisher is located

If planning to handle weeds, branches, litter etc please wear gloves.

If a thunderstorm is lurking please do NOT go out, especially if the time lapse between the lightning and thunder is reducing.

Gardening Safely

Do not garden alone, you could have an accident, and as the churchyard is large with large headstones you may not be either seen or heard if injured. Beware slippery surfaces, as slipping on wet grass can create awkward falls.

Beware holes either caused by animals trying to burrow or collapsed graves. Contact a colleague and/or find some soil and fill them in...

Do NOT lean on headstones as some are secured to the grave by a small amount of mortar, which crumbles over time. A headstone is heavy and could trap your leg.

Safety Maintenance

After gardening please clean all equipment used and ensure that all machinery is switched off before cleaning, refill fuel tanks outside.

No smoking around the garden storage area.

Sweep out the garden store.

Lock the store to ensure that unauthorized persons do not have access to garden tools.

Grassland management

From a Caring for God's Acre Webinar

Scenario 1 looks lovely. If you leave the area to grow within spring/summer for ~14 weeks and it looks nice. Likely it has been cut and collected regularly. Keep it up. Need to cut & collect before the grass yellows, or nutrients return to the ground.

Scenario 2 when long looks ok at first but with few flowers and starts to look a bit messy halfway through the season. Likely that you have rich soil and taller, tougher grasses outcompete smaller flower. Ensure grass is cut early enough and removed after each cut. Can use yellow rattle.

Scenario 3 an area has been left long for over a year and looks messy to start. Some areas like this can be good in a large churchyard for small mammals, reptiles, hedgehogs etc. However, for wildflowers we need to cut and clear for a few years monthly or 6 weekly to reduce the strength for coarse grasses. Try at least 3 times a year early June, early July and early Sept. Then carry on with cutting for long medium or short grass. Can try green hay spreading from richer areas.



Defined cutting and reduced cutting areas can make the management look purposeful

Be very careful with planting or seeding in any new species, find out the history and what's present naturally first. Ancient grasslands are best not added to.

Raking after cutting important to reduce smothering of smaller plants and to prevent nutrients going back into the soil Edges or areas within grave boundaries can sometimes be left to grow and flower even when the main areas need to be regularly mown






Surveying is best done over several months to record the variability

Drawing up a simple management plan

A basic format is an annotated map with a calendar of actions relating to the areas defined.

Here's a worked example begun as a draft for the churchyard of St Bartholomew's. It would need agreeing with the parish council as it's a closed churchyard that they have responsibility for.

Viewing satellite images e.g. from Google Maps or Bing can help to plot trees and shrubs more accurately than is possible from the ground.



Management Plan Calendar

Regular tasks, all/any months – check trees for wind damage, weed paths and flower bed, pull up sycamore

seedlings, gardening of flower bed area at NE of churchyard

- Jan trimming of ivy where it's growing up the church walls or over gravestones and tombs
- **Feb** pick up fallen twigs from trees before they get hidden as grass grows and damage mower later, make habitat pile by compost heap
- **Mar** initial high-level grass cut and collect everywhere if primroses not up or avoiding the reduced mowing area if they are flowering already, (no more hedge trimming or dense ivy clearance until end Aug and only emergency tree work)
- **Apr** regular mowing with grass collection except for reduced mowing area grass to compost heap in corner of church
- May regular mowing with grass collection except for reduced mowing area
- Jun regular mowing except for reduced mowing area
- Jul regular mowing short areas, early to mid-July strim/scythe & rake up cuttings on reduced mowing area
- Aug mowing as needed with grass collection everywhere
- Sep mowing as needed with grass collection everywhere
- **Oct** mowing as needed with grass collection until grass stops growing, carry out any hedge and tree maintenance
- Nov pick up fallen twigs from trees make habitat pile by compost area
- **Dec** pick up fallen twigs from trees, add to habitat pile

Things to avoid - do not clean gravestones/monuments of lichens and bryophytes, do not disturb nesting birds.
