



Ordination of Deacons

29 June 2024



A very warm welcome to Christ Church and to this very special service, as those whom God has called to serve him as deacons in this diocese are ordained. Deacons are called to 'proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love': a particular fulfilment of the calling given to all God's people. As we celebrate those who become deacons today, please pray for them and those who support them, for their parishes and those they serve; but also for all God's people as we seek to be God's light and love in the world.

If you normally receive **Communion** in your own church, and if you have been baptised, you are welcome to receive today. Otherwise, you are warmly invited to receive a blessing. Please follow the stewards' instructions.

Children are very welcome at Cathedral services. Please ask a steward if you would like children's resources. However, you may prefer to take them into the Cloister to run around, or into the Chapter House just off the Cloister, where there is play space and a large screen relaying the service.

A **large print** version of this service booklet is available from the stewards. There is a **hearing loop**, which is most effective in the centre of the Cathedral away from the pillars. Please feel free to **sit** or move around at any point during the service; and when invited to stand, sit or kneel, please use whatever posture is most helpful for you.

This is a public occasion and the service is **livestreamed and photographed**. If you do not wish to be filmed, please ask a steward. Still images captured by the photographer today may be used in materials published by Christ Church Cathedral or the Diocese of Oxford. The Greeting

Bishop Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The Congregation sits. The Bishop introduces the service.

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given a variety of ministries. Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known.





Theirs is a life of visible self-giving. Christ is the pattern of their calling and their commission; as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others.

Prayers of Penitence

Deacon God calls all people to obedience and faith.
As we prepare to celebrate his love in word and sacrament, let us remember our failings, confess our sins, and pray for strength to amend our lives.

We remain seated or kneel.

All Almighty God, our heavenly Father,
we have sinned against you
and against our neighbour

through negligence, through weakness,
through our own deliberate fault.
We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins.

The Presentation

The Archdeacons present those to be ordained, saying:

Bishop Steven, I present these persons to be ordained to the office of deacon in the Church of God.

The Archdeacons then read the name of each person, with the place where they are to serve. Each ordinand stands as their name is read.

When the ordinands have been presented, the Bishop turns to the Director of Ordinands and those involved with the ordinands' training, who all stand to respond.

Bishop Have those whose duty it is to know these ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning?

DDOs **They have.**

Bishop Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry?

DDOs **They do.**

The Bishop turns to the ordinands and asks:

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

The ordinands respond:

I do so believe.

Bishop I invite the Registrar to confirm that the ordinands have taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

Registrar They have duly taken the oath of allegiance to the Sovereign and the oath of canonical obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

Old Testament Reading

Acts 12: 1–11 (NRSV)

read by a Licensed Lay Minister

Reader A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him.

The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

The Declarations

The ordinands stand before the Bishop, who addresses the Congregation.

Deacons are called to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's kingdom. They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love. They are to serve the community in which they are set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people. They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.

Deacons share in the pastoral ministry of the Church and in leading God's people in worship. They preach the word and bring the needs of the world before the Church in intercession. They accompany those searching for faith and bring them to baptism. They assist in administering the sacraments; they distribute communion and minister to the sick and housebound.

Deacons are to seek nourishment from the Scriptures; they are to study them with God's people, that the whole Church may be equipped to live out the gospel in the world.

They are to be faithful in prayer, expectant and watchful for the signs of God's presence, as he reveals his kingdom among us.

The Bishop addresses the ordinands directly.

We trust that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to give yourself wholly to his service, that you may draw his people into that new life which God has prepared for those who love him.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

The Congregation sits.





Bishop Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Ordinands **I do so accept them.**

Bishop Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all studies that will deepen your faith and fit you to bear witness to the truth of the gospel?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**

Bishop Do you believe the doctrine of the Christian faith as the Church of England has received it, and in your ministry, will you expound and teach it?

Ordinands **I believe it and will so do.**

Bishop Will you strive to make the love of Christ known through word and example, and have a particular care for those in need?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**

Bishop Will you be a faithful servant in the household of God, after the example of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**

Bishop Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a pattern and example to Christ's people?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**

Bishop Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**

Bishop Will you accept the discipline of this Church and give due respect to those in authority?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**





Bishop Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to grow in holiness and grace?

Ordinands **By the help of God, I will.**

The Congregation stands and the ordinands turn to face them.

Bishop Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations. Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

All **It is.**

Bishop Will you continually pray for them?

All **We will.**

Bishop Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

All **We will.**

The ordinands turn back to face the Bishop, who continues addressing them.

In the name of our Lord, we bid you remember the greatness of the trust in which you are now to share: the ministry of Christ himself, who for our sake took the form of a servant.

Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness. In serving them you are serving Christ himself, before whom you will be called to account.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened.

Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The Congregation and the ordinands kneel. Silence is kept.

And now we give you thanks

and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:



The Bishop lays his hands on the head of each ordinand, saying:

Bishop Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant N for the office and work of a deacon in your Church.

When the Bishop has laid hands on all the ordinands, the prayer continues:

Bishop Through your Spirit, heavenly Father, give these your servants grace and power to fulfil their ministry. Make them faithful to serve and constant in advancing your gospel in the world. May they follow the example of Jesus Christ your Son, who washed the feet of his disciples, and set the needs of others before his own. May their life be disciplined and holy, their words declare your love and their actions reveal your glory, that your people may walk with them in the way of truth and be made ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ; to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever.

All Amen.

The Giving of the New Testament

The Congregation sits; the newly ordained deacons stand. The Bishop gives the New Testament to each of them, saying:

Receive this book, as a sign of the authority given you this day to speak God's word to his people. Build them up in his truth and serve them in his name.





The Welcome

On behalf of the clergy of the diocese, a member of the Cathedral Chapter welcomes the newly ordained deacons:

Canon We preach not ourselves but Christ Jesus as Lord and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake.

All We welcome you as fellow servants in the gospel: may Christ dwell in your hearts through faith, that you may be rooted and grounded in love.

The new deacons' training incumbents help them to vest in a stole or scarf, symbol of their new ministry.

Please offer one another a sign of peace as you are comfortable, with the words 'peace be with you,' 'the peace of the Lord,' or similar.



If you would like to receive Communion or a blessing, please wait in your place until you are invited by a steward to move towards one of the communion stations. Gluten-free wafers are available. Please do not intinct (dip) your wafer in the chalice. If you would like a blessing, please bring your order of service with you so that the ministers know that you want a blessing.

If you wish Communion to be brought to you, please speak to a steward.

As the distribution of Communion begins, the Choir sings the Agnus Dei. This is followed by the Anthem and by worship songs, in which you are welcome to join.

Theological Note

The ministry of deacons is an ancient one, begun by the first apostles in the book of Acts who selected ‘seven men of good standing, full of the Spirit and of wisdom,’ appointing them to the task of caring for those in need within the Christian community (Acts 6: 3), and setting them apart for this ministry by the laying on of hands.

Those who are ordained today to the diaconate are following a call to be visibly on the margin, in the liminal space between God and human society, between the church and the world. Their particular concern, like that of their forebears in Acts, is for those who are vulnerable, lonely or in material or spiritual need; it is their role to welcome newcomers, to accompany those exploring faith, to bring new Christians to baptism, and to bring the sacraments of the Church to those who are unable to enter the building.

During the service, the Bishop reads the ordination preface, describing the vocation of deacons and their role in the household of God’s church, and summing up their ministry as ‘reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.’

Most of those ordained as deacons will subsequently be ordained as priests, but the sacrament of ordination cannot be erased. Those made deacon today will remain deacons in all their ministry to come, wherever it may take them: called, blessed, and set apart for a ministry of making the love of God visible and present, in every place where God is most needed.

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The Declaration of Assent

The Declaration of Assent is made by deacons, priests and bishops of the Church of England when they are ordained and on each occasion when they take up a new appointment (Canon C 15). Today's candidates swore their oaths and made their declarations with the presiding bishop and registrar before the service.

When the new deacons are welcomed into their parishes, these declarations are often read out at a principal service.

Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

Declaration of Assent

I, A B, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

Oath of Allegiance

I, A B, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles III, his heirs and successors, according to law: So help me God.

Oath of Canonical Obedience

I, A B, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Lord Bishop of Oxford and his successors in all things lawful and honest: So help me God.
