Thoughts from our Chaplain

Once the Easter season has come to an end, the Church's calendar returns to Ordinary Time. The term "Ordinary Time" can make it sound as though there is nothing very noteworthy in this season, in which the default liturgical colour is green. When we consider that green is a colour associated with growth, perhaps this "ordinary" time might begin to seem a bit more special.



In any case, there are some key dates during this season. For Mothers' Union, this would certainly include Mary Sumner Day on 9th August. For every institution, the commemoration of the founder is an important occasion. As is the tradition in the liturgical calendar, Mary Sumner is remembered on the date of her death.

To the uninitiated it may seem a bit strange to recall a sad occasion, rather than a more conventionally happy one, such as a birthday. Our Easter celebrations a few weeks ago give us a different perspective on this. As Christians we believe in the Resurrection. The life of Mary Sumner was rooted in this faith. Her work and her witness were aimed at revealing

the kingdom of God, especially through the medium of family life. Mary Sumner knew that she was relying on a greater strength than her own. It is because the love of God in Jesus proved to be stronger than death, that we can celebrate the date of 9th August with joy and thanksgiving.

Mary Sumner wants us to grasp how great is God's love for us and for the people we are called to serve. These words are from the first reading for Mary Sumner Day, from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians: "I pray that you may have the power to comprehend with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fulness of God." Mary Sumner knew that this knowledge and love transform ordinary life into something extraordinary!

St Oswalds Millhouses held a Cream Tea in June when 60 people attended and everyone enjoyed it. Just over £600 was raised for AFIA.


St Francis Bessacarr raised £1.000 for AFIA from their monthly Soup Lunches and a Quiz Night

RISE UP

Against Domestic Abuse

Award Levels Bronze, Silver and Gold

Congratulations to St Catherine of Siena, Millhouses St Oswalds. Barnburgh St Peter, Wath All Saints and Harley Mission who have earned Bronze awards for their support of the Rise Up against abuse campaign.

These awards recognise groups that are raising awareness and supporting local domestic abuse organisations through meaningful action. We are encouraged by the dedication shown.

Can your branch achieve a bronze award or even a silver award?

To achieve the Bronze award your branch or church should:

- Put a RISE UP poster raising awareness about domestic abuse in an appropriate public place such as in churches, toilets, community centres, village halls etc.
- Commit to pray for those affected by domestic abuse, including the victims, survivors, perpetrators, and those who work in the field of domestic abuse.
- Make a connection with your local domestic abuse support organisation to see how you can support them. You could offer moving in and moving on packages.

- Host at least one annual speaker from other organisations to speak about domestic abuse (e.g. Restored or other regionally appropriate organisations).
- Speakers from Mothers' Union should ask for collections to go towards our RISE UP work.
- 3. Use the healthy relationship study materials.
- Include information about abuse and helpful resources in church/branch communications (helplines etc.).
- Preach about equality and mutual respect in all forms of relationships, including equality in relationships in youth work/children's work.
- 6. Reach out to churches without an MU branch and actively promote MU and the RISE UP challenge, therefore developing new member opportunities.
- 7. Attend the bystander webinar.

Read Aloud Project

One of our link Diocese, Kebbi in Nigeria has been undergoing unrest lately please continue to pray for them along with our other link Dioceses Central Zimbabwe, Lango in Uganda, Tamale in Ghana, and Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands, also Sheffield Diocese Link with the Diocese of Bondo in Kenva.

Diocesan Member, Margaret Wood sent photos of two MU ladies: Auntie Adie 91 (no glasses) and Auntie Madge 92. Margaret has known them for years and they are both MU members in St. Mary's on the Braak in Stellenbosch, a town in the Western Cape province of South Africa.

Margaret also sent a photo of Gloria, who she met on her visit to South Africa in 2023 at the MU Thanksgiving Service then met her again last year when the new Bishop was Consecrated. She has a beautiful singing voice and wears her bra on top of her clothes with pride in belief in women's equality. The cloth for Gloria's uniform is very popular and MU Members always dress in their clothes to represent their club.







Mary is also a keen supporter of the C M S (Church Mission Society) and they have given their permission for this article to be produced in our Newsline to show the work done by CMS and MU together.

Andy Hart and his family went to work in Iringa, Tanzania, with CMS. They had to boil their drinking water for at least 10 minutes to ensure that it was safe to drink. It was very labour intensive for local Tanzanians, as wood for fuel had to be gathered, and then it was necessary for the water boiling to be supervised. While it is obviously beneficial to have safe drinking water, the smoke generated during boiling is not.

Apparently, more women and young children in Africa die from disease related to exposure to smoke from cooking fires than die from malaria. However there is another way of getting safe water which requires less work and has no smoke and gives water with a very good taste.

This process is called SODIS. Empty, clear

plastic or glass bottles are filled with water and left in the sun for 6 hours on a piece of metal painted black. This kills more bugs in the water than boiling for ten minutes. Plastic bottles are thrown away in huge number in Tanzania, so SODIS means recycling! No

To introduce this simple technology to local people Andy trained MU groups in each church to go from house to house and train women in how to use the technology. They also went to schools to teach the children. This was an opportunity for evangelism. Each group learned how they could introduce Jesus into the conversation as the "water of life" and "quencher of thirst". Thus their MU groups, which are at the heart of the church are able to visit every household in the village with a solution to safe water, a way of reducing each woman's workload and the message of the Gospel.

For Andy, this has been the best development project we have been able to undertake, combining physical and spiritual outreach.


In Melbourne Cathedral, I was pleased to find a version of the Mary Sumner prayer and the MU banners.

Kathleen Snow was formally commissioned as Worldwide President of Mothers' Union by Archbishop of York at St Martin-in-the-Fields. London.

As Mothers' Union moves towards its 150th anniversary in 2026, Kathleen and her board will lead under the theme 'Join Us, Join In!' - a call to action to grow the movement in faith, fellowship, and funds to end poverty, injustice and violence for communities around the world.

She shares her reflections on the significance of the event and the spirit of unity it represented.

"It was a profound honour to be present at such a deeply spiritual and historic moment for the global Church. The inauguration of Pope Leo XIV was a powerful reminder of the shared hope and mission that unite us across traditions.

I was especially moved by the Pope's continued emphasis on unity, peace and mission values that lie at the heart of Mothers' Union's work worldwide.

He appealed for a united Church, to be "a sign of unity and communion, which becomes a leaven for a reconciled world". He also encouraged the faithful to "Look to Christ! Come closer to him..." and to "Listen to his offer of love and become his one family: in the one Christ, we are one."

It was a message of hope and encouragement, received well by the thousands gathered for the inauguration Mass, which took place in St Peter's Basilica and St Peter's Square. It was incredibly moving to be one of the people there.

Being part of the Anglican delegation, alongside leaders committed to reconciliation and partnership, reaffirmed my belief that when we stand together in faith and purpose, we can help bring healing and hope to a fractured world.

Mothers' Union stands in solidarity with the wider Christian family, working on reconciliation, supporting families, and upholding justice for all people - guided by faith, compassion, and community.

Bishop Pete's sermon

from the Commissioning Service: based on Mark 6.34: Compassion

Introduction


Well, Jo-Anne: obviously this sermon is addressed to you, personally, as you take up this new responsibility, as the President of the Mothers' Union in this Diocese of Sheffield. But actually this sermon is also addressed to every other member of the Mothers' Union who is present here today, and to those who are not members but have come along to support you this afternoon, and in fact to anyone else who might pick up on this message after today. This afternoon. I want to urge you to make a priority of compassion both for yourself personally in your interactions with others in the role of MU president, and for the MU as an organisation, in so far as you have been called by God to lead it. Please make a priority of compassion. Actually, that seems to me a message Mary Sumner herself would welcome. Compassion for those near at hand and compassion for those far away has been a clear hallmark of the MU pretty much throughout the almost 150 years since its foundation. Next year will be a major milestone, of course, and I hope compassion will be the hallmark of that anniversary too.

Compassion

So let me start with a bit of quiz trivia. How many times would you guess the word compassion comes in the four gospels added together? More than 50 anyone? Less than 20 anyone? Well, surprising as it might be, the answer is just 12. The word is sprinkled very sparingly across the four Gospels, like a rare and expensive spice. It's used very carefully, very deliberately, very sparsely. In fact, it's used five times in Matthew's Gospel, four times in Mark, three times in Luke, and not at all by John. Isn't that surprising? Not once in the Gospel of

Compassion for those near at hand and compassion for those far away has been a clear hallmark of the MU.

John! And here's the interesting thing: in Matthew, Mark and Luke, the word is only ever used in the closest possible association with the Lord Jesus. The word compassion only ever comes on the lips of Jesus in the course of a parable (that happens 3 times in all); or it comes in the words of the Evangelist about Jesus, to describe the reaction, the emotion of Jesus in the face of human need, as he reaches out in love and pity to those he meets (and that comes 9 times in all).



Compassion in the Parables of Jesus

Take the parables, first of all: these are the three occasions when the word compassion comes on the lips of Jesus. You won't be surprised if I tell you that one of those occasions is in the Parable of the Good Samaritan, where Jesus uses it to describe the reaction of the title hero in Luke chapter 10, when he comes across the man who has been mugged and left for dead. 'A Samaritan', Jesus says, 'while traveling, came near him, and when he saw him, he was moved with compassion. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured wine and oil on them'. And you won't be surprised if I tell you that another of those occasions is in the Parable of the Prodigal Son, in Luke chapter 15, where Jesus uses it to describe the reaction of the father to the returning prodigal: 'But while he was still far off', Jesus says, 'his father saw him and was filled with compassion;

he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him'. The third parable is less well known. It comes in Matthew, to describe the reaction of a master to his deeply indebted slave: 'Out of compassion for him', Jesus tell us, 'the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt'.

In the middle case, the Parable of the Prodigal Son, Jesus is exhorting us to believe that God regards us, his prodigals, with compassion. He loves us and is always waiting for us to come home, and longs to run to us, to put his arms around us and to kiss us. And in the first and last cases, in the other two parables, Jesus is encouraging us to see that we are called to regard one another, and especially those we encounter who are in need, in the same way, reaching out to them in love and pity.

Bishop Pete's sermon

from the Commissioning Service: based on Mark 6.34: Compassion

Compassion in the Ministry of Jesus

And in all the other nine cases in the Gospel. four others in Matthew, the four in Mark, and once more in Luke, the Gospel writers show Jesus, practising what he was preaching. So, when he encounters a leper, in Mark chapter 1. we're told, 'Moved with compassion Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him and healed him'. In Luke chapter 7, when Jesus encounters a funeral procession, in which a widow from Nain is going to bury her son, it says, 'When the Lord saw her, he had compassion for her and said to her, 'Do not weep'. Then he came to the coffin, and the bearers stood still. And he said, 'Young man, I say to you Arise. The dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother'. Or to give just one more example, when Jesus meets two blind men in Matthew chapter 20, we're told, 'Moved with compassion, Jesus touched their eyes. Immediately they regained their sight and followed him.

In every single one of these cases, the same Greek word is used. It's one of my favourite Greek words, and not just because it's so hard to pronounce. It's splank-nis-thes. It means something like 'gut-wrenching care' – literally, the word has to do with the bowels.

We might say, his heart went out to them'. It was a physical feeling of pity and love. Jesus cared so much, he felt it in his stomach.

When the great crowd thronged about Jesus, he had compassion for them because they were like sheep without a shepherd.

And as I say, this word is only used twelve times in all four Gospels put together. It's a holy word, set apart for special association with Jesus. And our gospel reading this afternoon makes up the set.

When the great crowd thronged about Jesus, he had compassion for them because they were like sheep without a shepherd. He didn't look out at them and see a bunch of hell-deserving sinners, provoking his wrath. He didn't see a bunch of wasters, a bunch of scroungers, provoking his contempt. He saw people in need, lacking direction and purpose in life, and his heart went out to them. He didn't stop to ask if they deserved his help; he didn't berate them for bothering him; he just looked out at them and had compassion on them.





Compassion in our experience

And dear friends, it is just that way with each one of us as well. The same Lord Jesus sees us in all our need. He really doesn't regard us hell-deserving sinners, not even as failures and wasters and ne'er-do-wells. He sees the help we need with the challenges of life, and he has compassion on us. He doesn't tell us off. He doesn't scold us. He doesn't turn his back on us, as if our needs are trivial to him and He has more important matters to attend to. He reaches out to us in love and pity. That's the good news of the gospel and on a commission-ing day like today it's right to return to the heart of our faith, which is the love of God for each one of us, as taught and modelled by Jesus. That's the good news.

But of course, there is also a challenge. For this is the same standard of love and pity, with which Jesus calls us to respond to our friend, neighbours and family members in their need. Yes, that includes the ones who annoy us and irritate us by the things they say and do, it includes the ones who make choices which not only differ from the choices we would make but actually

cut across the choices we want to make. It includes the ones we regard as selfish or foolish or downright rude. It's especially when it is difficult or inconvenient that we are called to respond with compassion.

Jo-Anne, I hope compassion will be the hallmark of your tenure as the President of the Mothers' Union for the Diocese of Sheffield and, as I say, I hope it will particularly be the hallmark of any plans you have for the 150th birthday celebrations you may be organising next year. But since the Gospel writers use compassion so carefully, to emphasise that it was a hallmark of Jesus' teaching and a hallmark of Jesus' ministry, it surely follows it should be a hallmark of the life of every Christian, every disciple, every follower of the Lord Jesus, every baptised person.

I'm nearly done. One last thing. Lights for Christ. Compassion.

Here's that verse again. Mark 6.34: As Jesus went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd.

95 NOT OUT:

Sheffield's oldest preaching Lay Reader?

A celebration of Joan Wragg, MU member at St Oswalds

On St Valentine's Day she celebrated her 95th birthday in the Waggon and Horses pub in Millhouses, across the road from where she lives. She had invited not only her family, but also friends and the congregation of St Oswald's who turned out in strength to enjoy fellowship together in a different setting.

Two days later, she preached at St Oswald's during Morning Prayer. St Oswald's is currently in a vacancy but visiting clergy, visits to neighbours at Carter Knowle Methodist Church and a monthly Mattins led by two Lay Readers keep the worship going on a regular basis with developing spirituality, enthusiastic hymn singing, preaching from the lections of the day, and "Joys and Sorrows" being shared as intentions and prayer by members of the congregation each week.

Following the lovely surprise celebration of my fifty years as an MU member at Whiston, I received a request from Elizabeth. Could I write something for Newsline about MU fifty years ago?

What a difference fifty years makes. Whiston Church had a bigger, thriving congregation which included a large number of young families with children attending 'Sunday Club'.

There had been a Mothers' Union branch since 1915 which by 1974 comprised mostly of more elderly members. Margaret Cook, who had joined more recently as a new Mum decided we needed 'something for younger mothers'. Mildred Morgan (Rector's wife and Enrolling Member) told her to 'get on with it', so she did! Twelve of us were invited and met, in Margaret's front room in March 1974 and formed, what became, a second branch which met in the evenings (E.M.U)..

The branch grew steadily. Meetings were

not vastly different from our current ones - a service (using the MU book) including the MU prayer, (which has been 'revamped' twice since) followed by a speaker (initially a number of MU speakers introducing us to the various groups etc) or a discussion. We learned about AFIA, IMPC, 'Overseas' etc. and the STAR scheme (Sheffield Temporary Accommodation for Relatives) - a group of ladies who provided accommodation for family members who could not, otherwise, easily visit their relatives who were being treated in Sheffield hospitals.

We enjoyed non-MU speakers such as clergy, reps from various charities/areas of interest and people who shared experiences of

holidays abroad. Discussions included topical subjects and some years later the issue of the 'Ordination of women' featured prominently on the programmes of both afternoon and evening branches. Both branches of course, were involved in church garden parties and enjoyed meals out – nothing new there!

Having lived in this area all my life and been Rotherham/Laughton Deanery Leader, I have, by default, become custodian of a number of Branch and Deanery diaries/record books etc. dating from 1912! The number of branches seemed to peak around 1938 when there were 24 branches in the 'Rural Deanery of Rotherham' which included Laughton-enle-Morthen. We now have 4 branches in the Rotherham and Laughton Deanery, many of our members, including me, being rather long in the tooth! I wonder how long we will continue?


What we have been doing in our Deaneries and Branches
