Sunday



Traditional | Quiet | Communion

This is a traditional service with readings from the bible, a sermon and communion.

This service lasts approximately half an hour.



Hymns | Organ | Family-friendly | Communion
The Service for all the Church Family. This is a traditional service with hymns, readings from the Bible, a sermon and communion. You will be welcomed to the Church by the sound of our bells. There is usually an Organist, Choir, and Serving Team present for this service.

This service lasts approximately one hour.

Refreshments are served afterwards.

We run a Children's Church at this service during term time on the first, second and fourth sundays of the month.

Traditional | Hymns | Prayer ServiceEvening prayer with readings from the bible.

This service lasts approximately twenty minutes to half an hour.

Monday



Traditional | Prayer Service

Morning prayer with readings from the bible (you are unable to register attendance at this service for schools).

This service lasts approximately half an hour.

Tuesday



Meditation | Healing | Communion

On the first Tuesday of the month a short service of Holy Communion with the laying on of hands, prayers for healing and anointing with oil.

On the fourth Tuesday of the month a quiet, reflective service for those who've experienced suffering or loss.

At other times this is a quiet evening service with readings from the bible, a short address and communion. The service involves some form of Christian meditative, contemplative or reflective prayer.

These services last approximately half an hour.

Thursday



Traditional | Communion

This is a traditional service with readings from the bible, a sermon and communion. Refreshments are served afterwards.

This service lasts approximately half an hour.

Guide to a Communion Service

Welcome! If you're new to church, everything might feel unfamiliar—but don't worry! This guide will walk you through each part of the service and help you feel at home.

1. Gathering & Welcome

When the service begins, the clergy, choir, and other ministers process into the church while a hymn is sung. This marks the start of worship, bringing us together as one. The presiding minister welcomes everyone and there is the sharing of any important church news.

2. Opening Prayers

We pray together, asking God to cleanse our hearts and prepare us for worship. This reminds us that God knows us completely, welcomes us, and invites us into His presence just as we are.

3. Confession & Forgiveness

We acknowledge that we don't always get things right and ask God for forgiveness. This is an opportunity for reflection, knowing that God's love and mercy are always available.

4. Hymn of Praise (Gloria)

This joyful hymn celebrates who God is and His love for us. We praise Him for His goodness and grace! This song of the angels in Luke 2:13-14, when they appeared to the shepherds on the night of Jesus' birth.

5. Bible Readings

We listen to passages from the Old Testament and New Testament, including a reading from the Gospels (the stories of Jesus' life and teachings). The Gospel is processed to the center of the church, reminding us that Jesus is at the heart of everything we do.

6. Sermon

The priest or preacher offers a reflection on the readings, exploring how they apply to our lives today. This is a time to learn, reflect, and grow in faith.

7. The Creed

We stand to declare our faith together using words that Christians have shared for centuries. This is a way of affirming our belief in God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit.

8. Prayers for Others (Intercessions)

We pray for the world, our community, those in need, and those who have died. This is a moment to bring our hopes, concerns, and gratitude before God.

9. Sharing Peace

We turn to those around us and say, "Peace be with you." This reminds us that we are all part of one family, united in God's love.

We usually shake hands with the person next to us as a sign of peace, others wave and you may see others hugging each other.

10. Holy Communion (Eucharist)

This is the central part of the service. We bless bread and wine just as Jesus did at the Last Supper, remembering His sacrifice and love.

- If you usually receive Communion in your own church, you're welcome to receive it here. If you are baptised you can receive communion.
- If you don't want to take Communion, you can come forward for a blessing instead—just hold a hymn book to show this.
- If you want to stay in your pew for now, that's ok as well.

11. Closing Blessing & Sending Out

The service ends with a final blessing and words of encouragement to go out and live our faith. We then sing a final hymn, and the ministers process out.

On Sunday at 9:30am and Thursday 10:30am, this is not the end! We move to the annexe for refreshments and conversation. Please come through and make some new friends. You are most welcome
