

At the far end of the vicarage garden are two trees that have grown a few feet apart. They lean towards each other so much that their branches hug one another, it's like they are in an eternal cuddle. I haven't a clue when they started growing or how long they will stand there but it serves to remind me of the bible passage in Matthew 28 when Jesus says to his disciples, 'I will always be with you, even to the end of the age'.

Or in Romans, when Paul writes, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

There's something about worshipping God in his creation that is special. I love church but I also love to get out into God's natural cathedral sometimes. A friend of mine leads a monthly worship service in his local woodland. They sing hymns, read from the bible, pray, listen to a talk and use the woodland in various ways to engage with God in his creation. If you remember we did something similar on the beach last year, and I'd love to try that again, perhaps in September.



It got me thinking about my personal prayer, where do I like to pray myself? For the last few weeks a few of us have been meeting on a Thursday morning at 9.00am in the Lady Chapel in church. It's lovely and peaceful in there (we have broken up for Summer now but will be back in September if you want to join us then). Often people come into the main nave of St Peter's and pray, often they light a candle. I like to sit on a bench looking out to sea to pray occasionally, or in my favourite chair with a cuppa overlooking the vicarage garden. Actually, it doesn't matter where we pray, God can hear us anywhere, but it is good to step out of the business of our routine on a regular basis and talk to God.

Back to those trees in the back garden. Much as I love to look at them, and even though they do teach me how much God loves me, and even though they might get a hug from me now and then, and even though they have been growing there for decades and will continue there for decades to come in all likelihood, they are not divine, they are not God . They, like me, are created by God who loves his creation, particularly me.... And you!







Rev'd Elaine writes...

It's holiday time. Quite a few of us have already had a break this year, I have just returned from 3 weeks in Norway, the Arctic Circle, Iceland and Greenland and yes, thank you, I had a wonderful time. As my husband was ill last year and before that Covid was still rearing it's ugly head, I had not been away for three years and my sons felt I needed a break and it wasn't until I was away that I realised how right they were. I also realise that I am extremely fortunate to be able to go away on such an amazing holiday. With the cost of living crisis, many people will be staying at home this year.

I hope those who aren't going away are perhaps planning a few days out or special activities. It's great to sometimes just change our routine. The idea of holidays developed during the early 1800s and various resorts developed with the building of pleasure piers. We are lucky being near not only the coast but near the Victorian resort of Saltburn. The tradition of a holiday by the seaside continues to be a peculiarly British thing. Before I retired I lived 4 miles from Royal Leamington Spa and it grew as a town because of the appeal of the "Spa". Many Victorian ladies and gentlemen realised the benefit of "taking the waters". In the sixties and seventies holiday to other countries became popular because of the advent of the "package" holiday.

Sociological studies of the benefits of taking time-out and discussion about work / life balance have been undertaken with increasing regularity and it appears we are more productive when we take a break from work. Well, God knew this and established ideas of Sabbath and festivals into the law guiding the lives of his chosen people back in the time of Moses over 3000 years ago. The word 'holiday' is derived from 'holy day' and goes back to such provisions.

And yet, while holiday providers are coming up with more and more exciting ideas and wonderful destinations, many employers seem to be putting people under pressure to work longer and longer hours. We can often feel that if we work longer we will get more done and prove our loyalty and commitment to our jobs. This is generally not the case and we should be careful of this. Many can burn out through not taking time off each week and proper breaks during the year. As I said earlier, I didn't realise how tired I was until I stopped!

But God's provisions weren't simply about time off and work / life balance. They were about finding space for time with him in busy lives. Festivals often involved pilgrimages to Jerusalem and the Temple. Although our holidays are no longer holy days as such, perhaps we should look for opportunities to connect with God while we are out of the stress and business of the work environment. Enjoy the wonders of the world we live in and thank God for them. Perhaps spend some time thinking about the place God has in your life during holidays and during the rest of the year.

If not, I hope you have the chance to have a break and do something different for a time and enjoy some days out. If this doesn't seem likely, then try to get out for a walk or a drive in or around the coast or the moors – we live in a stunningly beautiful area. BIBLE CAKE

This was first published in St Peter's Parish Magazine in August 2016.

It was taken from an old recipe book called "The Friendship Cook Book", hand produced by the Ladies' Friendship Circle of Ormskirk Street United Reformed Church in St Helens. Each recipe was contributed by a member of the Ladies' Circle, this one by Valerie Stead. Have a go at looking up all the Bible references for the ingredients—it's good fun. I have made the cake and can vouch that a slice with butter is excellent with a cup of tea!

The answers are on page 18—Daphne Wood

INGREDIENTS

1. ½lb Judges V, verse 25 (last clause)
2. ½lb Jeremiah VI, verse 20
3. 1 tablespoon I Samuel XIV, verse 25
4. 3 Jeremiah XVII, verse 11
5. ½lb I Samuel XXX, verse 12
6. ½lb Nahum III, verse 12 (chopped)
7. 2oz Numbers XVII, verse 8 (blanched and chopped)
8. 1lb I Kings IV, verse 22
9. Season to taste with II Chronicles IX, verse 9
10. Pinch Leviticus II, verse 15
11. 1 teaspoon Amos IV, verse 5
12. 3 tablespoons Judges IV, verse 19

METHOD

Beat Nos. 1, 2 and 3 to a cream. Add No 4, one at a time, still beating

Then Nos 5, 6, and 7 and beat again. Add Nos 8, 9, 10 and 11 having previously mixed and lastly No 12

Bake in a slow oven (Gas mark 3) for 1½ hours

BIBLE CAKE - THE ANSWERS

Judges V, verse 25	'curdled milk'
Jeremiah VI, verse 20	'sweet calamus'
I Samuel XIV, verse 25	'honey'
Jeremiah XVII, verse 11	'eggs'
I Samuel XXX, verse 12	'raisins'
Nahum III, verse 12	'figs'
Numbers XVII, verse 8	'almonds'
I Kings IV, verse 22	'flour'
II Chronicles IX, verse 9	'spices'
Leviticus II, verse 15	'salt'
Amos IV, verse 5	'leavened bread'
Judges IV, verse 19	'water' and 'milk'

BIBLE CAKE—A Modern Interpretation (tried and tested!)

INGREDIENTS

½lb (225g)	Softened butter or baking margarine
½lb (225g)	Golden caster sugar
1 tablespoon	Honey
3	Eggs, medium or large
½lb (225g)	Raisins
½lb (225g)	Dried figs, chopped
2oz (50g)	Almonds, blanched and chopped
1lb (450g)	Self raising flour
1 teaspoon	Mixed spice
Pinch	Salt
1 teaspoon	Baking powder
3 tablespoons	Milk

METHOD

Beat the softened butter together with the sugar and honey until light and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, beating in between. Add the raisins, figs and almonds and mix in thoroughly. Sift the flour, mixed spice, salt and baking powder together and fold into the mixture. Lastly stir in the milk.

Put the mixture into greased and lined cake tins—it makes 2 x 2lb (900g) loaf tins or 1 x 9 inch (23cm) round or 1 x 8 inch (20cm) square

Bake in a slow oven (375° F, 170° C, 160° Fan, Gas Mark 3) for approx. 1 hour (loaf tins) or 1½hours (large tin).

EAST REDCAR RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION



On Saturday, 22nd July our hard work came to fruition with the unveiling of Robert Wilson's Commonwealth War Grave. The day started with a little drizzle, so we decided to put up a gazebo. We borrowed 12 chairs from the Sacred Heart Church; thanks to them some of the older visitors and the Mayor were able to sit down during the service.

The men from the Legion, the RAFA, and the cadets with the bugler led by Eric Howden BEM, dipped the standards at the RAF memorial and marched into the cemetery to the graveside.

Ged introduced the story of Robert's early years and W.O. Mick Coverdale RAF Blackhall M.B.E. continued the story of the accident at the Battle of Britain display where all the crew lost their lives in the tragic accident. He outlined the finding of Robert's details and how he had contacted Dot from the Friends to find the grave.



He then unveiled the stone. Wreaths were laid by Stockton and Hartlepool RAFA, the stone was blessed, and prayers were said by Revd Andy Greiff of St Peter's Church. Eric Howden recited the declaration. The bugler played the last post. We sang the National Anthem to conclude the event.

Thanks to the Bowling Club for the use of the function room and for opening the bar. Thanks to the Friends for making sandwiches, scones, cakes, biscuits, gateaux and for serving the refreshments and for the washing up.

This was a whole group contribution, thanks to all as we needed many hands to help with the planning and execution of this very moving event.




