Views From the Vicarage February 2024



How do you approach Lent? With indifference, renewed determination, anticipation, dread?

Actually, there is no biblical instruction to keep the 40 days of lent Holy or different to any other period of 40 days of the year.

I come from a tradition that never gave Lent a second thought; I guess the reason being that it was expected that in every day of the year were to strive to be Holy, to lead a disciplined life and to look towards the cross that we remembered every Sunday at Communion. But since becoming a part of the Anglican denomination I've realised that it does no harm to remind oneself of the need to follow Christ in the best way we can, and if that takes focussing on the rhythm of the liturgical year then so be it.

So what will I be doing during Lent? I usually like to read a book as part of my daily devotions. We will be putting on a Lent course (watch out for information about that), there's the pancake party on Shrove Tuesday, Experience Easter with the local schools, a concert in aid of the organ restoration fund as well as a recital by Bishop Paul during Holy Week. Talking about Holy Week, there will be something to come to most days, including a Messy Church and a moment to pause at the cross on Good Friday.

Whatever you decide to do this Easter, my prayer is that we all grow nearer to our God and challenge ourselves as we take up our cross to follow Jesus on the way.

And may God bless us with enough foolishness


To believe that we can make a difference in the world,





Just A Thought?

In St Peter's Ark we are currently learning about the twelve disciples. We are trying to learn their names through games and songs. As Christians we all know that Jesus chose twelve original disciples. This was not random, these twelve were his leadership team. They were going to be his ambassadors for his kingdom, so they were chosen with care.

I found this article by Mary Fairchild on learnreligions.com and found it useful, I hope you do too.

“Jesus Christ selected the 12 apostles from among his early followers to become his closest companions. After an intensive discipleship course and following his resurrection from the dead, the Lord fully commissioned the apostles (Matthew 28:16-2, Mark 16:15) to advance God's kingdom and carry the gospel message to the world.

We find the names of the 12 disciples in Matthew 10:2-4, Mark 3:14-19, and Luke 6:13-16. These men became the pioneering leaders of the New Testament church, but they were not without faults and shortcomings. Interestingly, not one of the chosen apostles was a scholar or rabbi. These men had no extraordinary skills. Neither religious nor refined, they were ordinary people, just like you and me.

But God chose them for a purpose — to fan the flames of the gospel that would spread across the face of the earth and continue to burn bright throughout centuries to follow. God selected and used each of these ordinary men to carry out his exceptional plan.

Meet the 12 Apostles of Jesus Christ

Take a few moments to learn about the 12 apostles of Jesus and their characteristics. Discover lessons from the men who helped ignite the light of truth that still dwells within hearts today and calls people to come and follow Christ.

Peter

Without question, Peter was a disciple most people can identify with. One minute he was walking on water by faith, and the next he was sinking in doubt. Impulsive and emotional, Peter is best known for denying Jesus when the pressure was on. Even so, as a disciple he was dearly loved by Christ, holding a special place among the twelve.

Peter, a spokesman for the twelve, stands out in the Gospels. Whenever the men are listed, Peter's name is first. He, James, and John formed the inner circle of Jesus' closest companions. These three alone were given the privilege of experiencing the transfiguration, along with a few other extraordinary revelations of Jesus.

After the resurrection, Peter became a bold evangelist and missionary, and one of the greatest leaders of the early church. Passionate until the end, historians record that when Peter was sentenced to death by crucifixion, he requested that his head be turned toward the ground because he did not feel worthy to die in the same manner as his Saviour.

Andrew

The apostle Andrew abandoned John the Baptist to become the first follower of Jesus of Nazareth, but John the Baptist didn't mind. He knew his mission was to point people to the Messiah.

Like many of us, Andrew lived in the shadow of his more famous sibling, Simon Peter. All four Gospels identify Andrew as Peter's brother. The pair was from Bethsaida, a coastal town on the Sea of Galilee.

Andrew led Peter to Christ, then stepped into the background as his boisterous brother became a leader among the apostles and in the early church.

The Gospels don't tell us a great deal about Andrew, but reading between the lines reveals a person who thirsted for truth and found it in the living water of Jesus. In the life of Andrew, we discover how a simple fisherman dropped his nets on the shore and went on to become a remarkable fisher of men.

James

Each of the synoptic Gospels identify James as an early disciple of Jesus. James the son of Zebedee, often called James the Greater to distinguish him from the other apostle named James, was a member of Christ's inner circle, which included his brother, the apostle John, and Peter.

Not only did James and John earn a special nickname from the Lord — "sons of thunder" — they were privileged to be at the front and centre of three supernatural events in the life of Christ. In addition to these honours, James was the first of the 12 apostles to be martyred for his faith in A.D. 44.

John

The apostle John, brother to James, was nicknamed by Jesus one of the "sons of thunder," but he liked to call himself "the disciple whom Jesus loved." John was probably younger than James since he is usually mentioned after him. Together with their father Zebedee, the brothers were fishermen when Jesus called them.

With his fiery temperament and special devotion to the Saviour, John gained a favoured place in Christ's inner circle. His enormous impact on the early Christian church and his larger-than-life personality, make him a fascinating character study. His writings reveal contrasting traits. For instance, on the first Easter morning, with his typical zeal and enthusiasm, John raced Peter to the tomb after Mary Magdalene reported that it was now empty. Although John won the race and bragged about this achievement in his Gospel (John 20:1-9), he humbly allowed Peter to enter the tomb first. According to tradition, John outlived all of the other disciples, dying of old age in Ephesus, where he preached a gospel of love and taught against heresy.

Philip

Philip was one of the first followers of Jesus Christ, and he wasted no time calling others, like Nathaniel, to do the same. Philip plays a larger role in the Gospel of John than he does in the other three Gospels.

In John 14:8–9, Philip asks Jesus, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." Jesus replies, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and yet you still don't know who I am? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father!"

Although little is known about him after the ascension of Christ, Bible historians believe Philip preached the gospel in Phrygia, in Asia Minor, and died a martyr there at Hierapolis. One thing we know for certain, Philip's search for the truth led him directly to the promised Messiah.

Nathaniel or Bartholomew

Nathaniel, believed to be the disciple Bartholomew, experienced a jarring first encounter with Jesus. When the apostle Philip called him to come and meet the Messiah, Nathaniel was sceptical, but he followed along anyway. As Philip introduced him to Jesus, the Lord declared, "Here is a true Israelite, in whom there is nothing false." Immediately Nathaniel wanted to know, "How do you know me?"

Jesus got his attention when he answered, "I saw you while you were still under the fig tree before Philip called you." Well, that stopped Nathaniel in his tracks. Shocked and surprised he declared, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the King of Israel."

Nathaniel has only a few lines in the Gospels, nevertheless, in that instant, he became a loyal follower of Jesus Christ.

Matthew

Levi, who became the apostle Matthew, was a customs official in Capernaum who taxed imports and exports based on his own judgment. The Jews hated him because he worked for Rome and betrayed his compatriots.

But when Matthew the dishonest tax collector heard two words from Jesus, "Follow me," he left everything and obeyed. Like us, he longed to be accepted and loved. Matthew recognized Jesus as someone worth sacrificing for, so he gave up his comfortable life to serve and follow him.

Thomas

The apostle Thomas is often referred to as "Doubting Thomas" because he refused to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead until he saw and touched Christ's physical wounds. As far as disciples go, however, history has dealt Thomas a raw deal. After all, each of the 12 apostles, except John, abandoned Jesus during his trial and death at Calvary.

Thomas was prone to extremes. Earlier he had demonstrated courageous faith, willing to risk his own life to follow Jesus into Judea. There is an important lesson to be gained from studying Thomas: If we are truly seeking to know the truth, and we are honest with ourselves and others about our struggles and doubts, God will faithfully meet us and reveal himself to us, just as he did for Thomas.

James the Less

James the Less is one of the most obscure disciples in the Bible. The only things we know for certain are his name and that he was present in the upper room of Jerusalem after Christ ascended to heaven.

In *Twelve Ordinary Men*, John MacArthur suggests that his obscurity may have been the distinguishing mark of his life. It's quite possible that James the Less' complete anonymity reveals something profound about his character.

Simon the Zealot

Who doesn't like a good mystery? One puzzling question in the Bible is the exact identity of Simon the Zealot, the Bible's own mystery apostle.

Scripture tells us almost nothing about Simon. In the Gospels, he is mentioned in three places, but only to list his name. In Acts 1:13 we learn that he was present with the apostles in the upper room of Jerusalem after Christ had ascended to heaven. Beyond those few details, we can only speculate about Simon and his designation as a Zealot.

Thaddeus or Jude

Listed together with Simon the Zealot and James the Less, the apostle Thaddeus completes a grouping of the least known disciples. In *Twelve Ordinary Men*, John MacArthur's book about the apostles, Thaddeus is characterised as a tender-hearted, gentle man who displayed childlike humility.

Judas Iscariot

Judas Iscariot is the apostle who betrayed Jesus with a kiss. For this supreme act of treachery, some would say Judas Iscariot made the greatest error in history.

Down through time, people have had mixed feelings about Judas. Some experience a sense of hatred toward him, others feel pity, and some have even considered him a hero. No matter how you react to Judas, one thing is certain, believers can benefit greatly by taking a serious look at his life."

The war in Gaza-Israel – Bishops urge people to pray – and act

“The first thing Christians can do in response to war is to pray for peace and for those affected.” That is the message of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York. The Archbishops are praying for “those mourning, those injured, and all those fearing for their safety,” and for “restraint on all sides, and renewed efforts towards a just peace for all.” The Archbishops and Bishops are also encouraging Christians throughout the UK to join them in prayer, and to consider practical action, by supporting organisations “working to promote peace and human flourishing in the Middle East.”

The following is posted on the Church of England website:

Christian Aid is the official ecumenical arm of Churches in Britain and Ireland and has been working with the poorest and most vulnerable people in the Middle East since the early 1950s, when it provided humanitarian relief to Palestinian refugees.

The Church Mission Society is a historic Anglican mission society which supports mission partners across the region.

The Council of Christians and Jews is a leading interfaith charity which works to help Jews and Christians to meet, to understand each other better and to create meaningful engagement between the communities.

Embrace the Middle East is an ecumenical Christian charity working to help marginalised and vulnerable communities in the Middle East.

Friends of the Holy Land is a non-political Christian Charity whose mission it is to secure a resilient and enduring Christian community in the West Bank, Gaza, Israel and Jordan - the part of the world that Christians call the Holy Land.

I am the victor, but you do not cheer Me,


I am the holy dove whom you will slay.

We have made some progress this month as the gates in all sections have been refurbished. The pedestrian gates have had the dates put on when each section was opened. They look much tidier and this was worth doing. We hope to have the Pay Back scheme to finish the painting of the middle section railings, They will start again in April when the better weather comes.

This is a special year for us as this year it has been 150 years since the old section of the cemetery was opened. It is also 20 years since we started the group. We have held our 20th AGM and the group continues as strong as ever.

These are our proposed plans for the celebration of 150th years the old section opened:

- Opening of the Peter Rabbit garden, this perhaps could be in May when it is national cemeteries week
- Have a seat with a Squirrel Nutkin image installed that is compliant with the Beatrix Potter branding agreement we have entered into
- 150 year banner to be made and flown
- Put in for the Green Flag award.
- Gain grade two status for the arch at the old section

We are undertaking an in-depth study of the trees in the cemetery.

60 trees were planted by the Redcar board in 1891.

We hope to attach a name safely to the trees without damage them, under the guidance of the Tees valley Wildlife Trust, and set up a tree trail with activities for youngsters. Once all this preparation work is carried out we hope to have children testing the trail out.




NEWS FROM EAST REDCAR RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION


